

The No. 6-ranked Cardinal (17-6, 2-4 Pac-12) travel to Washington (16-9, 3-3) this weekend for a pre-Easter series starting on Thursday and continuing on Friday at 5 p.m. and ending on Saturday at 1 p.m. The Cardinal are coming off a come-from-behind 9-8, extra inning win over Saint Mary's on Monday after dropping three-straight at No. 8-ranked Arizona last week. The Cardinal travel to Cal on Monday and host Pacific Tuesday, giving the Cardinal 13 games in a span of 17 days.

In the Rankings

• Stanford dropped to No. 6 in both Baseball America and the USA Today/Coaches Poll and are No. 16 in Collegiate Baseball. Stanford was ranked No. 1 in the USA Today Coaches Poll the last week of February and were in the top-two in each of the first seven weeks of the season. It was the first No. 1 ranking since 2004 and 10th time during the regular season since 1989 the Cardinal have hit No. 1. In 12 of the last 25 seasons Stanford has been ranked at No. 1.

About the Huskies

(Bat: .288, Pitch: 3.30, Field: .983)

• Washington is 3-3 in the Pac-12, winning a series over Oregon and dropping last weekend's series at Oregon State. Overall they are 16-9. CF Jayce Ray leads the club with a .344 average with 19 runs and 11 RBIs. Michael Campo-reale leads the Huskies with 17 RBIs. From the mound, Josh Fredendall has a 1.42 ERA in 12 relief appearances. Starter Aaron West is 4-1 with a 2.01 ERA in seven starts while Austin Voth has a 4-1 record and 4.66 ERA in seven starts.

Pitching Matchups

• RHP Mark Appel (3-1, 3.56), LHP Brett Mooneyham (5-1, 1.96) and LHP John Hochstatter (3-3, 2.32) are slated to go for the Cardinal. UW will send RHPs Aaron West (4-1, 2.01), Tyler Davis (2-1, 2.27) and Austin Voth (4-1, 4.66).

Opening Day on the Farm

• Stanford has had at least one major leaguer in each of the last 54 years, as this year five players are slated to be on opening day rosters. Jeremy Guthrie, traded to the Rockies in the off season, will be the Opening Day starter on Friday when the Rockies are in Houston to take on two Cardinal starters in catcher Jason Castro and shortstop Jed Lowrie. John Mayberry, Jr. is slated to start at first for the Phillies; Sam Fuld is a returning starter for the Rays. New Padres outfielder Carlos Quentin and Nationals closer Drew Storen, will begin the season on the disabled list with a possible return by mid-April. In addition, Ruben Amaro, Jr. (GM with Phillies), Kenny Williams (GM with White Sox) and AJ Hinch (VP of Scouting with Padres) are all in the executive wing. And it doesn't stop there-- Dave Flemming (Giants), Kris Atteberry (Twins) and Dave Raymond (Astros) are all former Stanford students calling games in the big leagues.



Defensive Mishaps

• Over the first four games last week (1-3 record), Stanford made 14 errors for a .917 fielding percentage. The Cardinal had just 15 errors over the first 17 games (.976 fielding), producing a 15-2 record. They did not commit an error on Sunday at Arizona. Last week Stanford gave up 11 unearned runs, outscoring opponents 30-25 but going 1-4.

Wild Win over Saint Mary's

- Danny Diekroeger's pinch hit one-out RBI single in the 12th finished off a wild night, as No. 6-ranked Stanford (17-6) defeated Saint Mary's 9-8 in 12 innings, after trailing 8-3 in the ninth inning. The game also saw third baseman Stephen Piscotty pitch twice. Brian Ragira's two-run double, followed by Austin Wilson's two-run single completed the five-run ninth and sent it into extra innings at 8-8. Piscotty had gotten the final two outs in the eighth, and after Garrett Hughes' perfect ninth inning, was sent back out there in the 10th (after Hughes was pinch-hit for). Piscotty secured another 3.0 shutout innings for the win. Piscotty struck out three and retired seven in a row.

Stanford Swept in Tucson

- No. 2-ranked Stanford (16-6, 2-4 Pac-12) struggled defensively over the first two games of the series at No. 8-ranked Arizona, getting swept in Tucson for the first time since 1993. In the opener, Stanford had a 7-4 lead into the ninth only to watch the Wildcats score four times and win 8-7, the final three runs scoring on a two-RBI single and error to centerfield. Arizona committed five errors of its own on Friday. Mark Appel after giving up four runs in the first three innings, reached the ninth in the no-decision. On Saturday, the Wildcats took the series and Konner Wade struck out seven and pitched a three-hitter. Brett Mooneyham (5-1) lost for the first time on the season as the Cardinal dropped its first top-10 and first overall series of the year (won first five). Stanford's three errors gave them 14 over the previous four games for a .917 fielding percentage after committing just 15 over the first 17 games (.976). In the Sunday finale, James Farris pitched a six-hitter as John Hochstatter (3-3) dropped his third-straight start. Stanford hit just .181 in the Arizona series, while the Pac-12 leaders hit .371.

Stanford Coaching Staff

Director of Baseball

- Mark Marquess '69 enters his 36th season as the Clarke and Elizabeth Nelson Director of Baseball. He entered the season with an overall record of 1422-741-7, producing 2 NCAA titles (1987, 1988), 7 Super Regionals (six titles), 14 College World Series, 27 NCAA Regionals and 12 conference titles. He is one of just 10 coaches to have played and coached in a CWS, doing so while a player in 1967. He also won a Gold medal as the head coach of the 1998 Seoul Olympic team and won a gold medal at the 1967 Pan Am Games. He carries a 120-59 postseason record and 36-25 CWS mark.

Longtime Lieutenant

- Fellow alum, Dean Stotz '75, has been with Marquess for all 35 years. In his current role, he is the team's primary hitting coach, since 1997. As the recruiting coordinator he has had two of the top-five classes in 2010 and 2011. He has developed such Major Leaguers as Carlos Quentin, Johnny Bench Award winner Ryan Garko, Sam Fuld, Jody Gerut and Jed Lowrie. From 1993 to 1996 he was the team's pitching coach, working with Cardinal stars Kyle Peterson, Chad Hutchinson and Jeff Austin.

Pitching

- Veteran coach Rusty Filter, who spent the first 17 years at San Diego State will serve as the team's pitching coach in his third season. In his first year with 12 underclassmen, the Cardinal pitchers lowered its ERA a half a point from a year earlier. San Diego State led the Mountain West Conference in ERA in six of the league's first 10 seasons, ranking in the top-three in each of those years. Individually, four players were named the MWC's Pitcher of the Year, including Stephen Strasburg the last two years (2008, 2009), Bruce Billings (2005), and Scott Shoemaker (2004). In 2009, four of his hurlers-- Cincinnati's Aaron Harang, St. Louis' Royce Ring, Boston's Jason Masterson and San Francisco's Alex Hinshaw, pitched in the Majors.

On the bases

- Dean Stotz '75 will be the third base coach and Brock Ungricht, who will also work with the Cardinal catchers, will coach first base.

Coaches of Note

- Two of the Cardinal's national title stars from the 1987 and 1988 teams are in opposing dugouts, David Esquer (Cal) and Ed Sprague (Pacific). Esquer was the starting shortstop for the 1987 club, while Sprague was the starting third baseman for both the 1987 and 1988 clubs. Sprague also won a World Series title with the Blue Jays. Mark Macholtz, another member of the 1987 team, is the coach at Gonzaga.

Game-Winners

• With Monday's 9-8, 12th inning victory, Stanford now has four wins in its last at-bat. Danny Diekroeger drove in the winning run in the 12th after Stanford scored five in the ninth to send it to extra innings against Saint Mary's on April 2. Homers won three games this year-- Austin Wilson's walk-off two-run homer in the ninth against USC, Stephen Piscotty's two-run homer at Pacific in the 11th and Justin Ringo's two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth against Rice.

Hit Streak Ends for Smith

• Eric Smith's 12-game hit streak ended last Saturday, as the streak watched his average rise from .150 to .328. He hit 18-for-44 (.409) over the streak. Smith enters the week batting .310, fourth on the team.

Starts at the Top

• Leadoff hitter and centerfielder Jake Stewart is having a career season, leading the club with a .348 average while scoring 21 times from the leadoff spot. Stewart has been the team's starting centerfielder for three seasons, batting .209 as a freshman and .287 as a sophomore.

Balanced Lineup

• Following RBI leader Stephen Piscotty (25), Austin Wilson has driven in 24 runs and Eric Smith (18) and Brian Ragira (18) have chipped in another 36 RBIs. Wilson leads the club with eight multi-RBI games, while Smith is second with six.

Consistent at Second

• Junior second baseman Kenny Diekroeger has settled into second base, fielding at an overall clip of .973 this season after being a starter at third and short over his first two seasons. The club's leading hitter as a freshman, the now junior is batting .297 this season and is a co-leader with nine doubles.

Double Trouble

• Over the first 23 games of the season, Stanford has racked up 59 doubles led by Stephen Piscotty and Kenny Diekroeger's nine a piece. Stephen Piscotty has seven as five players have at least six two-baggers this season.

Low-Scoring Opponents

• Stanford has given up two or fewer runs in 11 games. The Cardinal enter the week ranked third in the Pac-12 in ERA and fourth in opponent batting average. The Cardinal have won 10 contests allowing two or fewer runs. The backend of the rotation has



Strikeout Leaders

- LHP Brett Mooneyham enters the week with the Pac-12's most strikeouts at 53 with RHP Mark Appel right behind him with 52 punchouts.

Vanegas Continues Upward Climb

- A.J. Vanegas continues to watch his ERA drop, as the sophomore righthander who was jostled from the starting rotation after week one, has given up just two earned runs over the last three games and 15.0 innings to lower his ERA to 3.26 over six games.

Mooneyham Suffers First Loss

- Lefthander Brett Mooneyham, who missed the 2010 season with a finger injury, won his first five starts of the season, before dropping a 4-2 decision on Saturday at No. 8 Arizona. Mooneyham is still 5-1 with a 1.96 ERA over those six starts with 53 strikeouts and 20 walks over 41.1 innings. He has reached the sixth inning in all six starts and struck out seven in each of those outings. Mooneyham leads the Pac-12 in strikeouts (53), is fourth in ERA (1.96) and seventh in opponent average (.201).

Appel Racking up the Innings

- Friday night starter Mark Appel battled to reach the ninth inning in his last start, a no-decision at No. 8 Arizona. The junior had given up four runs over the first three innings, before settling down and pitching eight-plus innings. In six starts this season he has racked up 48.0 innings, reaching the seventh inning in each start. He has also struck out at least 10 in three starts. Appel ranks eighth in the Pac-12 in innings (48.0) and is second in strikeouts (52) and fourth in opponent average (.201).

Regular Season Honors

- Stanford righthander Mark Appel was named the Pac-12's Pitcher of the Week after a career-best 10 strikeouts in the win over No. 7 Texas. For the second-straight week to begin the year, Collegebaseball360 honored a Cardinal performer for its national weekly honor, choosing centerfielder Jake Stewart for his .538 average against Texas as well as his defensive efforts in center. Freshman LHP John Hochstatter was honored the first week after 6.1 no-hit innings of relief work.

We Can't Make This Up

Major league shortstop Jed Lowrie's off-season consisted of a two-week safari to Africa on his honeymoon, saying "Right before we went to sleep our guide brought us to the tent, showed us around and gave us an air horn and said, 'Blow this if there's a lion in your tent.'" Indian infielder Cord Phelps met up with two former players, Stephen Brown and Nolan Gallagher, in Jerusalem after Brown and Gallagher rode through Africa on motorcycles.

World Champions

Since Tillie Shafer in 1912 and 1913 with the New York Giants, 16 former players have appeared in the Fall Classic, winning a combined 12 rings. Bobby Brown won four titles with the Yankees in the 1940s and 1950s, while Ed Sprague won back-to-back titles with the Blue Jays in the 1990s. Sprague also part of Stanford's CWS national title runs.

Award Winners

Former greats Jim Lonborg (1967) and Jack McDowell (1993) have each won Cy Young Awards. Bob Boone won a gold glove at catcher seven times from 1978 to 1989 and Mike Mussina was a gold glove winner from 1996 to 2008, seven times. Lonborg (1967), Boon (1976, 78, 79, 83), Ed Sprague (1991), McDowell (1991-93), Mussina (1992-94, 97-98) and Carlos Quentin were all All-Stars. All-Star Shawn Green originally signed on with the Cardinal before accepting a minor league deal in the 1990s. He is a year away from graduating.

Major League Style

- Since the turn of the Century, Stanford has had 89 players all-time reach the Majors. Marquess has coached 56 Major Leaguers since 1977 (58 over that time have made the Majors with current White Sox GM Kenny Williams only playing football at Stanford and All-Star Shawn Green accepting a baseball scholarship but instead going to the draft).

Notables Off the Bench

25th Anniversary of Back-to-Back Champions

• The 2012 season marks the 25th Anniversary of the 1987 and 1988 national champions under Mark Marquess. During the final weekend of the year the teams will be honored. That Cal team is coached by former shortstop David Esquer, who was the starting shortstop in 1987. The pregame ceremony will occur May 26. Number of Straight Years with an Active Major Leaguer

• According to research by Washington State, Stanford has had 54-straight years with at least one Major Leaguer, dating all the way back to 1958 and Chuck Essegian (Phillies) and Dave Melton (Kansas City A's). USC has had a Major Leaguer every year since 1939, a span of 72 years.

Get Your Degree Under Marquess and Make the Majors

• Of Stanford's 56 Major Leaguers under Mark Marquess, 47 have earned their degrees. Four of those players-- Drew Storen, Jason Castro, Michael Taylor and Cord Phelps are current Major Leaguers, who take classes in the off season. A 2011 Wall Street Journal report said that only two dozen Major Leaguers had earned their degrees in 2010. Some Cardinal Major Leaguers who have earned their degrees include: Gold Glove catcher Bob Boone, Cy Young Award winner Jack McDowell (communications), All Star Mike Mussina (economics), Phillies general manager Ruben Amaro, Jr., (biology) former manager A.J. Hinch (psychology) and long-time Major Leaguers Mike Aldrete (communications) and Jeffrey Hammonds (history). Marquess himself was a politics major, whose freshman roommate just happened to be Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney.

Could No. 1 Picks Make History?

• Stanford quarterback Andrew Luck is the projected No. 1 pick in this year's NFL draft after leading the Cardinal to back to back BCS Bowl berths. RHP Mark Appel is projected as the No. 1 pick in the June draft. No school has ever had a No. 1 pick in the NFL and MLB in the same year. According to research done by Comcast SportsNet Bay Area, here are schools with No. 1 picks in the NFL and MLB:

Two-Sport Tradition

• Cardinal have had a number of great two-sport stars. One of the first was Ernie Nevers, who starred for the Cardinal in the early part of the 20th Century. Since his arrival, in the fall of 1965, Mark Marquess' (mar-QUESS) impact upon Stanford baseball is beyond measure. A member of the American Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame, Marquess opened the season as the seventh-winningest coach in NCAA Division-I baseball history - fourth among active skippers . He moved past USC's Rod Dedeaux's 1342 victories in 2009. Each of those victories have come on The Farm, as he has won more games than any coach in any sport ever at Stanford. As head coach of USA Baseball in 1981, Marquess guided the U.S. collegiate team to a gold medal at the World Games in Santa Clara. Following that accomplishment, he led the club to the gold medal at the Intercontinental Cup in Edmonton, Canada. His squad edged Cuba, 5-4, in the finals to mark the first time since 1970 that the United States had beaten the Cubans in international competition. In addition, Marquess became the only person ever to post victories over the Cuban team as both a player and a coach. Marquess' success as a coach can be traced to his days as a player. A three-year starter at first base for Stanford (1967-69), he earned first-team All-America honors in 1967 and garnered second-team All-America recognition in 1968. He was also named first-team All-Pac-8 and All-District-8 both seasons. Marquess' name is still etched in the school's record book, as his .404 batting average in 1967 is fifth all-time on the school's single-season list and his 15 career triples are tied for fifth. In addition, Marquess is one of only 10 to have both played in and coached at the College World Series. He also competed on the 1967 USA Pan American Games team that captured the gold medal. One of the greatest two-sport athletes ever on The Farm, he completed his collegiate baseball career with three seasons on the Stanford football squad as a quarterback, split end, defensive back and punt returner.


