

2007 YEAR IN REVIEW

At the conclusion of the 2007 collegiate softball season, the Stanford Cardinal looked back on another successful campaign. The squad posted its 11th consecutive winning season with a 35-21-1 overall record, earned an NCAA berth for the tenth-straight time and advanced to the Regional Championship.

The Cardinal began with an outstanding preseason, which accounted for much of the squad's 26-6 non-conference regular-season record. The Cardinal began the season with a 3-2 record at the competitive Kajikawa Classic in Phoenix, Ariz. and kicked off its longest winning streak of the year with a run-rule decision over Northwestern State.

Stanford won its first of three home tournaments in mid-February, as the Cardinal dropped just one contest over the three events. Stanford also claimed a tournament title at the FIU/Adidas Invitational in Miami, Fla., where Missy Penna pitched back-to-back one-hitters, went 23.1 scoreless innings, struck out 38 batters

and contributed to four shutouts.

Stanford opened a competitive Pac-10 season with an exciting 2-1 victory over the then-No. 17 Oregon State Beavers. Despite facing the most challenging conference schedule in the nation, the Cardinal managed to highlight the conference season with two wins over No. 12 UCLA, a home victory over No. 11 Washington and a 3-2 upset of eventual National Champion Arizona.

The Cardinal was rewarded with its tenth-consecutive postseason bid, and earned the right to play the first rounds on home turf at Smith Family Stadium. After a tough loss to Fresno State in the opening game, the Cardinal battled back to defeat Cal State Northridge to earn the right to play the Bulldogs again. Penna struck out 11 in a three-hit shutout, and led Stanford to the Regional Championship game. The Cardinal battled the No. 3 LSU Tigers offensively, recording nine hits, four doubles and a homerun, but fell in an 11-5 decision.

The Cardinal had much to be proud of in 2007, however. Freshman Alissa Haber got a fast and promising start to her college career, emerging as one of the top offensive players in the Pac-10. The Newark, Calif. native led the team in nearly every offensive category with a .365 batting average, 65 hits, 40 runs, 15 doubles, two triples, a .539 slugging percentage and a .455 on-base percentage. She was also one of the top three players on the squad with four homeruns, 23 RBI and four stolen bases. Her marks in batting average and doubles both ranked among the top-10 single-season marks in program history and

her batting average, on-base percentage, hit total and doubles marks were among the best in the Pac-10. At the conclusion of the season, Haber became the 12th Stanford player and fifth freshman to earn an All-America honor, extending the streak to ten-straight years of Stanford All-Americans.

Haber wasn't the only Stanford freshman to make an immediate impact for the Cardinal. Freshman catcher Rosey Neill led the conference in pick-offs and was third in the conference with 16 runners caught stealing. Shannon Koplitz posted the fourth-best batting average on the squad and tallied nine doubles and three homeruns in her freshman campaign. Michelle Schroeder, a key pinch runner for the Cardinal, scored 11 Stanford runs.

Penna continued to show her dominance in the circle, finishing fourth in the conference in opposing batting average (.193), strikeouts (308) and wins (25). She notched 12 shutouts and threw her second career no-hitter against Saint Mary's on Apr. 11. The sophomore became just the second player in Stanford history to notch 300+ strikeouts in a single season and, just halfway through her career, moved into third place on the career K's chart.

Jackie Rinehart finished the year as one of the top-10 players in Stanford history in seven categories, including hits, triples, runs and stolen bases. The left fielder left Stanford with a career .341 batting average, third on the all-time charts.

Seven players earned All-Pac-10 honors and five were named to All-Academic teams at the conclusion of the season, while Haber and Penna both earned All-Region honors.

At the end of the year, Stanford said goodbye to two outstanding seniors, Rinehart and Lindsay Key. In four years at Stanford, the duo led the Cardinal to 169 wins, its first Pac-10 Championship and a trip to the Women's College World Series.

BUCK / CARDINAL CLUB / SOFTBALL SCHOLARSHIPS



In June of 1934, the "Tiny Buck of the Month Club" was formed to raise the necessary funds from Stanford alumni and friends to pay the tuition costs for capable, worthy and needy student-athletes. As the Club's name implied, membership dues were one dollar per month and the word "tiny" was added to emphasize the modest amount and to honor head football coach, Claude "Tiny" Thornhill. The Club later

shortened its name to the "Stanford Buck Club" and revised its initial membership dues requirement.

Until the mid-1970's, there were no athletic scholarships for women, nor was there any fundraising organization devoted to this purpose. To accomplish the task of raising scholarship funds for women, the Cardinal Club was formed in 1977-78.

Under the guidance of the Buck and Cardinal Club leadership, a merged Buck/Cardinal Club was formed in 1987 to raise funds for both men's and women's athletic scholarships. The new volunteer organization was built on the fine Buck and Cardinal Club traditions that served both organizations well.

In 2007, the Stanford Athletic Department provided full operating budgets to all 35 varsity sports. These budgets include all of the components necessary for our programs to compete at the Division I level. Because of this, none of our varsity sports will be required to fundraise for their basic operating budgets effective fiscal year 2008 (September 1, 2007).

These new budgets will be funded in large part by a more robust Buck/Cardinal Club, enabling our head coaches and their staffs to focus their time and energy on coaching and recruiting instead of fundraising for basic operating budgets. Our donors will receive Buck/Cardinal Club benefits commensurate with their generosity.

Under the new Stanford Athletics annual giving program, the Buck/Cardinal Club will not only include its great scholarship tradition, but also assist the department's coaches and staff in providing the resources needed to compete at the highest level of NCAA Division I athletics.

Instead of receiving solicitations from individual sports, donors and friends of Stanford Athletics will now receive a single solicitation from the Buck/Cardinal Club. By giving a gift to the Buck/Cardinal Club, the donor is giving both their favorite sport, and all of Stanford's varsity sports, the budget resources they need. Donors will also have the opportunity to let us know which sports are their favorites at the time of the donation, and sports will keep in touch with donors who specify interest in that specific program.

BOYD AND JILL SMITH FAMILY STADIUM

The Stanford women's softball team plays its home games at the Boyd and Jill Smith Family Stadium, located just south of Sunken Diamond (baseball stadium). Phase One of the construction was completed prior to the 1997 season while Phase Two, completed in the spring of 2001, included permanent seating, restroom facilities, a new batting cage, and a press box.



The stadium has a fixed seating capacity of 820. The facility has a capacity of 1,500 and is scaleable to 3,500. The stadium has fixed, theater-style seating with individual seats. Wheelchair seating is located throughout the facility. Gates open one hour prior to the first pitch.

The field surface is a Bermuda Rye Blend, mowed to one inch.
