The East Palo Alto Tennis and Tutoring Program (EPATT) is proud to be associated with Stanford University and Stanford Tennis. EPATT provides one-on-one academic tutoring and group tennis instruction to one hundred disadvantaged youth per year. This unique endeavor, under the auspices of the Youth Tennis Advantage, strives to impact children academically, athletically and socially. EPATT is a past recipient of the Stanford University Community Partnership Award for its work with the East Palo Alto community, which it serves.

Tutoring sessions are conducted at the Taube Family Tennis Center after school and in the evenings in the Gwen and Victor Riches Pinewood Tutorial Rooms. The program facilities include four classrooms, and counter space, which include a library and computer center with Internet access. More than 120 Stanford students volunteer as academic tutors and tennis instructors per year.

Stanford Tennis Members hope these youths can be afforded some of the same opportunities they themselves have received as young people. An anonymous foundation provides season admissions to tennis matches for program participants. 

Patty Fendick-McCain won two NCAA titles in the 1980s and vaulted to a #4 doubles and #19 singles rankings while winning the Australian Open doubles title. Kathy Jordan (middle) enjoyed considerable success after winning a pair of AIAW doubles titles and a singles title. She later won seven Majors doubles titles and earned a WTA singles ranking as high as #4. Alycia Moulton (top right) won the first NCAA singles title after winning a pair of AIAW doubles titles. Laura Granville (lower left) captured two NCAA singles titles and has gone on to a top-40 WTA ranking. The 1999 NCAA Championship Team (above) was one of ten championship teams coached by Frank Brennan. Linda Gates (lower right) captured a singles NCAA title and two NCAA doubles titles.

Stanford is renowned as perhaps the finest women's tennis program in the United States. The Cardinal has captured more NCAA titles than any other school in history. Since the school captured its first national title in 1978 under Anne Gould, the school has since won 15 NCAA titles under current head coach Lele Forood and former head coach Frank Brennan. Numerous Stanford players have gone on to international success on the professional tour.



Lilia Osterloh, who captured the NCAA singles title as a freshman in 1997, has gone on to achieve a #41 singles ranking on the WTA tour.

### Stanford Tennis History

On the women's side, Linda Yeomans and Carol Hanks captured the USTA collegiate doubles crown in 1962 for Stanford's first of 20 individual collegiate titles.

Since 1975, when Stanford's women's team joined an already successful men's program, no other school has claimed more NCAA team titles. Stanford has held a stranglehold on NCAA and national team trophies from 1973 to the present, capturing 16 women's titles. Either of Stanford's tennis teams has won more collegiate titles by itself than all other men's and women's teams combined during that time period.

### Women Land 15 of 25 NCAA Team Titles

Only three years after the first athletic scholarship was awarded to a female player, the Stanford squad won its first national title – the AIAW Championship in 1978. In 1982, the Stanford women claimed their first ever NCAA team title. In total, the Cardinal women have captured 15 national championships: 1978, '82, '84, six straight from 1986-91, '97, '99, back-to-back crowns in 2001 and 2002, and currently three titles in a row from 2004-06.

Highlights of the women's performance over the last 25 years include its unprecedented streaks of six consecutive NCAA team titles (1986-91) and three straight NCAA Singles Champions on two different occasions (1985-87; 1989-91). Frank Brennan, who was inducted into the Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame in 2001, won 10 of those NCAA Championships in his 21 years at the helm (1980-2000). Lele Forood has

won five NCAA Team Championships in six years since taking over in 2001.

Since the 1980 campaign, the Stanford's women's team has had a remarkable dual match record of 678-53 (.927), including four perfect seasons in the last six years. During that time frame, the Cardinal has produced 16 team championships, as well as 12 singles champions, four doubles champions, five singles runners-up, and four doubles runners-up.

In 2001, Stanford was home to the singles champion (Laura Granville), singles runner-up (Lauren Kalvaria) and doubles runner-up (Granville/Gabriela Lastra). In 2002, Stanford produced the national doubles champions (Kalvaria/Lastra) and two singles semifinalists (Erin Burdette, Lastra). Amber Liu claimed back-to-back NCAA singles championships in 2003 and 2004.

Stanford has captured a remarkable 11 of the past 21 NCAA Singles Championships. The prestigious Honda Broderick Award has been given to seven Stanford players: Linda Gates (1985), Patty Fendick-McCain ('87), Sandra Birch ('89, '91), Debbie Graham ('90), Lilia Osterloh ('97), Marissa Irvin (2000) and Laura Granville ('01).

### Women's Tennis Professionals

On the women's tour, former Stanford star and two-time NCAA singles champ Patty Fendick-McCain was voted by the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) as its 1988 Rookie of the Year. Capping an impressive debut on the pro tour, Fendick-McCain was a member of both the U.S. Federation Cup and the U.S. Wightman Cup teams. In 1994, she teamed with 1990 NCAA doubles champion Meredith McGrath to win the Australian Open Doubles title. McGrath, who had defeated Martina Navratilova at Eastbourne, England, won the coveted WTA Comeback Player of the Year Award in 1994.

WTA honors also came for Marianne Werdel-Witmeyer ('86 All-American), who received the WTA Service Award and was elected Vice President of the WTA in 1994 and president in 1995. Debbie Graham,

who was the 1990 NCAA Singles Champion, was honored as 1992 WTA Rookie of the Year.

Many former Stanford players have been ranked within the top 100 on the tour. Cardinal standouts in the pros include Kathy Jordan (who was ranked as high as No. 5), Kate Gompert (18), Alycia Moulton (18), Anne Kremer (18), Patty Fendick-McCain (19), Marianne Werdel (21), Elise Burgin (22), Meredith McGrath (26), Lele Forood (30), Debbie Graham (35), Barbara Jordan (37), Lilia Osterloh (41), Tami Whitlinger (41), Laura Granville (46), Marissa Irvin (51) and Linda Gates (58).

Other honors abound on the WTA pro tour. Alycia Moulton was on the U.S. Wightman Cup team in 1985, and Burgin was a member of the U.S. Federation Cup team. In 1986, Burgin was captain of the Wightman Cup team. The year 1985 also marked the appearance of 10 former and current Stanford women in the main draw of the U.S. Open – a feat unmatched by any other collegiate tennis team. In 1986, seven former Stanford women appeared in the main draw of the U.S. Open.

Head coach Lele Forood, the 2003 Wilson/ITA National Coach of the Year and two-time Pac-10 Coach of the Year, enters her seventh year at the helm of the Cardinal. Last year, Forood captured her fifth NCAA team title in six years and the 15th NCAA Championship in school history.

The Cardinal also posted one runner-up finish during her tenure, falling to Florida 4-3 in the 2003 NCAA title match. After serving as an assistant and associate head coach at Stanford for 13 years, Forood has made the most of her time with the Cardinal women's tennis team, guiding them to a dominating 168-3 record.

Forood has directed the Cardinal to an 86-match winning streak, which remains in place entering the 2007 campaign. That includes three consecutive undefeated seasons: 2004 (29-0), 2005 (27-0) and 2006 (30-0).

In 2006, Forood guided the Cardinal to its 15th NCAA Team Championship in the 25-year history of the tournament. The Cardinal posted a 4-1 victory over Miami in the title match, claiming the hardware on its home court. Individually, five players (Alice Barnes, Celia Durkin, Amber Liu, Theresa Logar and Anne Yelsey) earned All-America honors.

Forood led Stanford to a 27-0 overall record and a 4-0 shutout of Texas in the 2005 NCAA Championship match. Barnes and Erin Burdette, the ITA Doubles Team of the Year, captured the NCAA Doubles Championship, besting teammates Liu and Yelsey in the finals. The Cardinal also won its 18th Pac-10 team title, while Barnes and Yelsey were crowned the conference doubles champions.

The first of three straight undefeated seasons occurred in 2004, as the Cardinal downed UCLA 4-1 in the NCAA Championship match. Forood helped Liu win her second straight NCAA Singles Championship, while doubles pair Lauren Barnikow and Burdette were named the ITA and Pac-10 Doubles Team of the Year.

Forood became the first female head coach to win the NCAA team title in 2001. The championship was the first for Forood, who was an assistant coach for five national title runs from 1989-1991 and in 1997 and 1999. She guided the Cardinal to a stellar 30-0 mark in her first complete season at the helm, as well as the 2000 Pac-10 Championship and a final No. 1 ranking. That year marked the seventh perfect season and first in over 10 years.

Forood replaced one of Stanford's all-time great coaches in Frank Brennan, who retired in June 2000 after 21 years and 10 national championships.

She was an assistant coach for 10 years before being promoted to associate head coach in March of 2000. In 1997, Forood's efforts in helping lead the Cardinal to the NCAA title were recognized as she was named the Division I National Assistant Coach of the Year by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association.



An All-American at Stanford 1976, the first year they started the All-American accolades, Forood was a National Collegiate singles finalist as a freshman and a semifinalist during her sophomore campaign in leading Stanford to two second place national finishes. Competing internationally, she captured the gold medal in both singles and doubles at the 1975 Pan American Games. She was also the 1975 national amateur singles and doubles champion. Forood was ranked as high as 30th on the women's professional tour, and she had an impressive victory over Wimbledon Champion and second-seed Virginia Wade at the 1977 U.S. Open. At the 1976 U.S. Open, Forood teamed with Rachel Giscafre to reach the doubles semifinals.

Forood was a member of the Board of Women's Tennis Associates from 1979-1987 and served as its secretary-treasurer from 1983-87. She has been extremely active in promoting WTA events, and was the recipient of the prestigious WTA Player Service Award in 1983. After the tour and before coming back to Stanford, she promoted the first professional women's tour event in France from 1986-1988 at Strasbourg.

A San Francisco native who grew up in Mill Valley, New York and then Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Forood earned a degree in sociology from Stanford in 1978.

Frankie Brennan, the 2005 Northwest Region ITA Assistant Coach of the Year and son of legendary former head coach Frank Brennan, enters his 12th year as an assistant coach on The Farm. In the last decade, Brennan has tutored 18 student-athletes to 46 All-America awards, has helped the Cardinal to a 318-12 record, as well as, 11 straight Pac-10 titles, seven national championships and three runner-up finishes in the NCAA Tournament. In 2003, he was honored as the ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year.

Brennan was a two-time All-Conference player for the University of Redlands, where he helped the team to a Final Four appearance in 1993 and a fifth-place national finish in 1994. He was also a two-time All-Conference player down the road at Foothill Junior College, where he helped lead the team to a semifinal appearance in the state championships in 1991 and a runner-up finish in 1992.

In 1991, Brennan was voted as *The Times Tribune* Athlete of the week twice, named MVP of the tennis team and nominated as *The Times Tribune* Athlete of the Year. He was also nominated for the Foothill College Male Athlete of the Year.

Brennan was head coach of the women's tennis team at the University of Redlands in 1995 before coming to work for his father in 1996. He has also worked for the United States Tennis Association, assisting in the Area Training Center and serving as a USTA zonal coach. Brennan has also been a hitting partner for Venus Williams and other top professionals over the last four years at the Bank of the West Classic. Brennan also played a few years on the satellite circuit.

Brennan prepped at St. Francis and Los Altos High schools, where he was a four-year letterwinner in both tennis and football. He finished his senior year on the East Coast at Mt. St. Joseph High School in Vermont where he was a standout running back on their State Championship football team.

A third generation coach, Brennan and his family have been involved with coaching tennis for years. His grandfather was Billie Jean King's coach for 18 years as well as the personal instructor to


former president Jimmy Carter and his family while he was in the White House. In May of 2002, *Inside Tennis* named the "Brennan Clan," Frank Sr., Jr. and III, to their top-10 list of "Guys Who Have Lent A Hand" to women's tennis.

Brennan resides in Mountain View, Calif., with wife, Shauna, a speech pathologist in the Hillsborough School District. The couple has two daughters, Madeline and Francesca, and a dog, Tide.

Few collegiate programs have enjoyed as much success as Stanford women's tennis. After all, the Cardinal enters the 2006-07 campaign riding an incredible 86-match winning streak and that includes three consecutive NCAA championships and five of the last six overall. With another national title this year, Stanford will possess a four-year stranglehold on the hardware, overshadowed only by a six-year run from 1986-91.

Of course, it's not out of the realm of possibility for the Cardinal to make it four in a row. Head coach Lele Forood, now in her seventh season at the helm of the Cardinal, is returning three All-Americans to a talented roster that includes a nice mix of seasoned veterans and youth. And she has already guided Stanford to five national championships during her tenure.

**Senior Theresa Logar**

Logar, a two-time All-American, advanced to the semifinals of the 2006 NCAA Singles Championship while knocking off top-ranked and second-seeded Kristi Miller of Georgia Tech along the way. She posted a team-best 39-6 overall record in addition to notching 20 wins against nationally-ranked opponents. 17 of Logar's 20 dual-match wins came at the No. 3 spot last year, and she will be counted on for production near the top of the lineup this season. Ranked at No. 3 in the preseason rankings, Logar is poised for a tremendous senior season.

**Senior Anne Yelsey**

Joining Logar as the other senior on the Cardinal roster will be Anne Yelsey. Also a two-time All-American, Yelsey and partner Alice Barnes were named the 2006 ITA National Doubles Team of the Year while finishing the season with a No. 1 ranking. She finished with a 31-4 overall record and was perfect in dual matches at 23-0. The majority of those wins came at the No. 4 spot, and it's a safe bet that Yelsey will be playing near the top of the lineup provided she is healthy.

**Junior Celia Durkin**

Originally a transfer from Harvard, Durkin lived up to her billing last year as she tallied a 36-5 overall record and 23-0 dual match mark. She even earned All-America honors by qualifying for the quarterfinals in the NCAA Singles Championship. She held down the No. 6 spot for the Cardinal last year in addition to compiling a 24-2 doubles mark with Amber Liu. For her efforts, Durkin was awarded a No. 20 preseason ranking and should provide the Cardinal with another proven option in the lineup.

**Junior Whitney Deason**


Deason registered a 27-9 overall mark and an 18-5 dual record in 2006-07 with most of those wins coming at the No. 5 spot. A fiery competitor, Deason finished the season ranked No. 48 in singles following a nice run in the NCAA Singles Championship, where she reached the Round of 32. Deason played with multiple partners in doubles last year, and the coaching staff would like for her to become a factor in doubles competition in addition to her singles prowess.

**Junior Lejla Hodzic**

Hodzic battled some injury problems early last year but appears fully recovered and ready to make an impact with a terrific, natural game. Hodzic managed a 10-3 singles record last year, including a 7-1 clip in dual matches. Her doubles play came together late in the year as well, teaming with Jessica Nguyen to notch five straight wins in NCAA Tournament competition.
