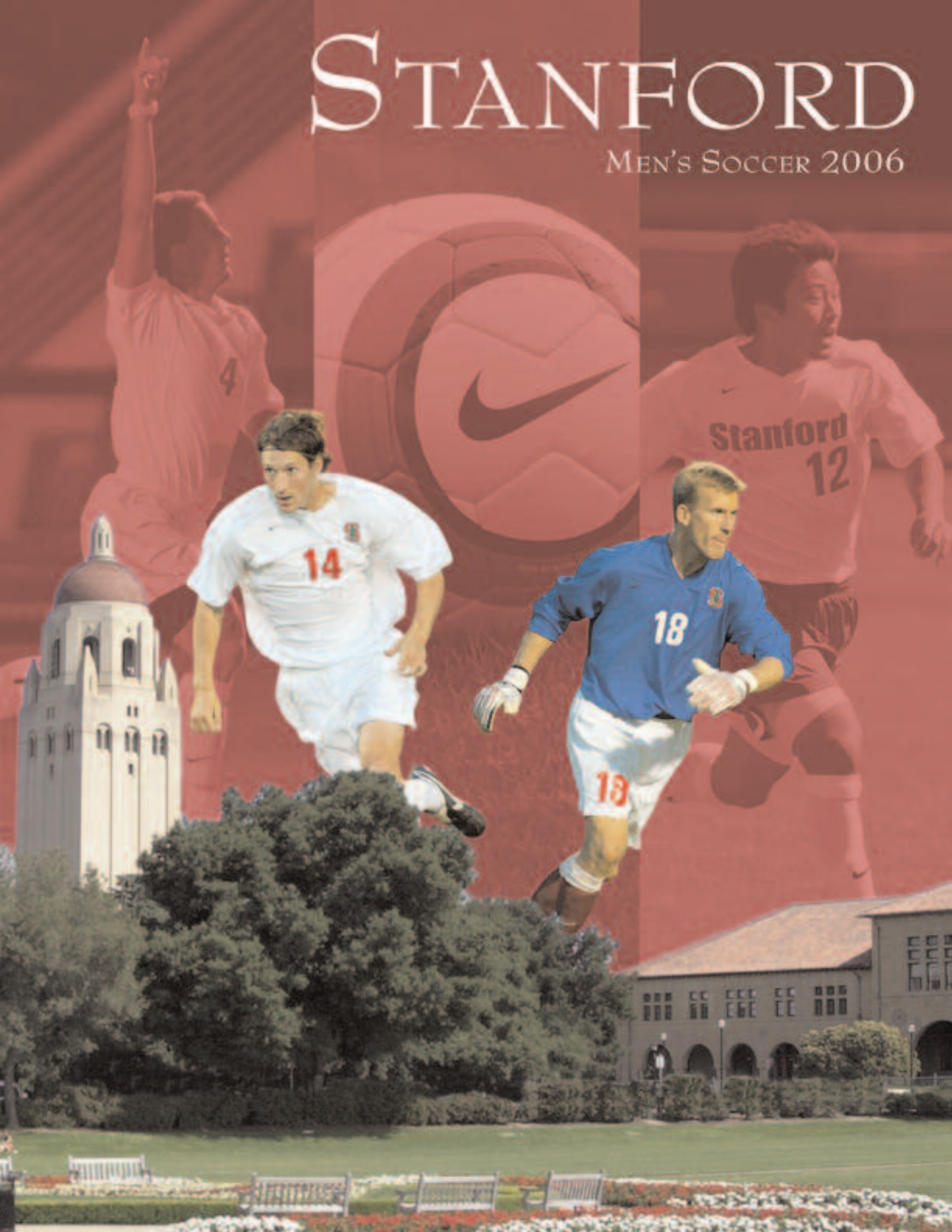

## Bret Simon

Head Coach  
Sixth Year

In his five years at the helm, head coach Bret Simon has taken the Stanford men's soccer program to an unprecedented

level of success. Simon piloted the Cardinal to consecutive College Cup appearances in his first two seasons on The Farm, including a trip to the championship game in 2002. Prior to Simon's arrival, Stanford had reached the College Cup just once when the Cardinal fell to Indiana in the 1998 finals. Entering his fifth season on The Farm in 2004, Simon has a 51-39-13 overall record and is 15-23-1 in Pac-10 play.

Stanford finished 4-11-3 overall during the 2005 season and 2-5-1 in conference play.

The Cardinal finished the 2004 campaign with a 7-6-5 overall and a 2-4-2 mark in Pac-10 play with Simon at the helm, narrowly missing out on postseason selection.

After experiencing great success in his first two seasons in charge of Stanford men's soccer, the Cardinal were hindered by injuries and inexperience in 2003 as they posted a program-low three wins. Simon leaned heavily on a highly touted freshman class throughout the season.

Simon avoided any sort of sophomore jinx when his 2002 club finished with an 18-5-2 overall record on its way to an NCAA runner-up finish. Simon, who was a semifinalist for Regional Coach of the Year, led a hot team to four straight NCAA Tournament victories and six consecutive wins overall late in the campaign to reach the national championship game versus UCLA.

In his rookie season at Stanford in 2001, Simon garnered two Coach of the Year honors when he was named the NSCAA/adidas Far West Regional Coach of the Year and Pac-10 Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinal to its first Pac-10 championship. Simon guided Stanford to its best overall record ever (19-2-1) as the club advanced to its second College Cup in program history and made its fifth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

Simon, the first coach to lead two different schools to the men's College Cup, has posted a 140-39-17 (.781) overall record in his nine seasons as a Division I head coach. He achieved his milestone 100th career win in his first season with the Cardinal, a 3-1 triumph over Cal State Fullerton on September 9, 2001.

Simon, who was the head coach at Creighton for six seasons before coming to Stanford, guided the Bluejays to the most successful season in school history in 2000 with a 22-4-0 overall record and a second trip to the College Cup in five years. A member of the men's soccer staff at Creighton for eight years, Simon finished his sixth season as the program's head coach with the 2000 College Cup national championship match. The team's appearance in the NCAA championship match was the first by any Bluejay athletic squad in school history. A four-time conference Coach of the Year honoree, Simon led Creighton to four postseason Missouri Valley Conference tourna-

ment championships, a pair of MVC regular-season titles and six NCAA Tournament appearances. Simon won 96 games at the school, which ranks second on the Bluejays' all time list.

After taking over the head coaching duties from Bob Warming on July 27, 1995, Simon guided the Bluejays to a 14-3-1 record and a sweep of the MVC regular-season and tournament titles. Simon followed up his first season success by leading the 1996 Bluejays to a 17-5-2 record, the MVC regular season championship and a trip to the NCAA College Cup. After the Bluejays swept through the MVC with a 5-0-0 record, Simon was voted the leagues to a 17-5-2 record, the MVC regular season championship and a trip to the NCAA College Cup. After the Bluejays swept through the MVC with a 5-0-0 record, Simon was voted the league's Co-Coach of the Year. In 1998, Simon's Bluejays produced a 16-4-2 record, reclaimed the MVC Tournament title and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, defeating both rival Saint Louis and defending national champion UCLA on the road. His 1999 squad recorded an 11-5-2 mark, finished second in the MVC and made its eighth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Simon was an assistant with Creighton for two seasons before assuming the role of head coach.

A 1980 graduate of Massachusetts at Amherst, Simon earned his Master's degree in business admin-

istration with an emphasis in marketing and management from Berry College in 1982. During a 13-year tenure at Berry, Simon was involved in numerous aspects of the athletic department including coaching, teaching and serving as the director of athletics.

Simon and the former Pam Gradoville, a member of the Creighton Athletic Hall of Fame for her successes on the basketball court, were married May 11, 1996. The couple has two sons, Benjamin and Jacob.

## Rob Becerra

Assistant Coach  
First Year

**R**ob Becerra begins his first season as an assistant coach for the Stanford men's soccer program in 2006.

Becerra joins Stanford after a highly successful stint at the University of Redlands as Assistant Athletic Director, Head Men's Soccer Coach and Instructor in the Department of Physical Education. In his first two years with the Bulldogs, he turned the program around, helping Redlands break into the top-25 national rankings for the first time. In 2001, he led the Bulldogs to their first conference title since 1967 and second in the program's history. The team rode this success to its first NCAA playoff appearance, where Becerra led the team all the way to the National Championship game. For these accomplishments, he was named 2001 All-Far West Regional Coach of the Year.

Through the end of the 2005 season, Becerra guided the Bulldogs to five consecutive conference titles, all leading to NCAA Playoff appearances. During his eight years at Redlands, Becerra boasts an overall conference record of 88-15-3. As of the 2005 season, Becerra owns an overall career record of 126-28-8. He also enjoyed his 100th career win when the Bulldogs dismantled the University of La Verne, 7-0, on September 25, 2004.

Further, Becerra is a member of the Region IV (west region) Olympic Development Program training and evaluating both field players and goalkeepers, as well as with the California South Olympic Development Program.

He is a graduate and former goalkeeper at the California State University San Bernardino and has a Masters degree in Management from the University of Redlands. A former goalkeeper at Cal State San Bernardino and a starting goalkeeper in the United States International Soccer League, Becerra brings a great deal of experience to the Cardinal program. He enjoys playing a variety of sports during his free time and is an avid sports fan. He and his wife, Samantha, have two daughters, Emma and Julia.



## Jon Pascale

Assistant Coach  
First Year

**J**on Pascale joins the Stanford men's soccer staff as an assistant coach in 2006.

Pascale most recently has been the Associate Head Coach at Georgetown University where he was involved in all aspects of that program. Pascale began his career at Georgetown in 2001. He helped lead the Hoyas to two BIG EAST Championship bids, including a run to the BIG EAST Semifinals in 2002. Under the guidance of Pascale Georgetown has produced four All-BIG EAST players including 2002 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year Jeff Curtin.

Pascale began his coaching career at the University of Pennsylvania under Rudy Fuller. He spent three seasons as an assistant coach with Penn between 1998-2000. While at Penn Pascale was responsible for recruiting, on-field coaching, conditioning and travel planning.

He has been an assessor in the Region I (east region) Olympic Development Program as well as a coach in the New Jersey Olympic Development Program. He's also coached teams in the Bowie Lightning Soccer Club and Directed the Georgetown Soccer Camp.

A 1998 graduate of American University, Pascale played four seasons for the Eagles. He graduated with a degree in Elementary Education.

# Stanford Looks to Experience and Hard Work in 2006

The Stanford men's soccer team, under the direction of head coach Bret Simon, is looking forward to an exciting and challenging season in 2006. Simon welcomes six newcomers to the 26-man squad that looks to build great team chemistry to help them down the road to success.

This year's team will have much more experience than the 2005 squad as 17 letterwinners return as well as nine starters. "We were a young team last year with six players in their first year," said Simon. "We're more experienced now. The team has worked exceptionally hard in the offseason and I think it will pay off."

Stanford's schedule will provide them with some tough competition in 2006 with '05 NCAA participants UCLA, California, Santa Clara, USF, Dartmouth and San Diego State on the schedule.

## Midfielders

The Cardinal will feature three senior midfielders in Galen Thompson, Bret Shimizu and Michael Brown. Redshirt junior Kyle Hency will likely fill out the foursome. Thompson made 12 starts in 18 games for Stanford last year, notching two goals and an assist. Shimizu, a 2005 Pac-10 All-Academic selection, saw time in 12 games for Stanford last season and tallied an assist against California. Brown started all 18 games for the Cardinal last season and scored the game-winning goal in Stanford's 3-2 win over Oregon State. He was a second-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection as well. Hency made 10 starts in 17 games played, including starts in the last seven games of the '05 season. He recorded one goal and one assist on the year and was an honorable mention Pac-10 All-Academic pick. Redshirt freshman Alex Kozachenko was impressive in the spring and looks ready to compete for meaningful playing time this fall as well.

The 2006 squad returns 17 letterwinners and nine starters from the 2005 season.





## Forwards

Offensive threats for Stanford include sophomore T.J. Novak, junior Evan Morgan and junior Dan Shapiro. Novak made five consecutive starts in 11 games played before a season-ending injury cut short his freshman campaign in '05. Morgan, a second-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection, made 15 appearances for the Cardinal last year and recorded two assists. Shapiro started all 18 games for the Cardinal and took 20 shots on the year including 10 on goal. He had two assists on the year and was a first-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection. Sophomore Tunji Munabi looks to build on his experience as a freshman after returning from a successful season with the Stanford track and field program. Redshirt junior Stephen Ringer hopes the injury bug is finally over and he can make an on-field contribution to the Cardinal attack.

## Defense

Juniors Ryan Oblak and Scott Bolkan will provide veteran leadership in the Stanford backline. Sophomore Tim Jones and junior Ryan Imamura will step up and help round out the defense. Oblak made 15 starts in 17 games played for Stanford and recorded his first collegiate goal against Oregon State. He was a second-team Pac-10 All-Academic selection. Bolkan started in all 18 games for Stanford in '05 and scored the Cardinal's lone goal against Oregon State (10/16). He first-team Pac-10 All-Academic pick as well. Tim Jones made 10 starts in 18 games played for the Cardinal, including 10 consecutive starts to close out the 2005 season. Imamura saw action in nine contests for Stanford last season. Redshirt sophomore Enrique Allen saw plenty of action in the spring game, along with junior Mark Bartlett and sophomore Michael Alexander. They are expected to provide additional depth and quality play in the defense.

## Goalkeeper

An injury to senior goalkeeper Andrew Kartunen in the offseason, will leave the goalkeeper position wide open for competition. Freshman John Moore, redshirt freshman Brent Stewart and sophomore Josh Nesbit will all vie for the starting position in net. Nesbit made four starts in goal for the

Cardinal last year recording 23 saves and a .852 save percentage.

## Newcomers

Joining the Cardinal this season are four freshmen – Moore, Thiago Sa Freire, Michael Strickland and Brant Bishop along with sophomore newcomers Tom Montgomery and Chris Huston-Ringstrom.

Moore is a graduate of Chino Hills High School where he was a four-year letterwinner in soccer and captained his team his senior year. He was the 2006 Male Scholar Athlete of the Year and a three-time all-league selection. He was tabbed MVP goalkeeper of the Surf Cup U19 Super Group in 2005. Sa Freire is a 2006 graduate of Christian Brothers College High School in Manchester, Missouri where he captained the soccer team his senior year. He was a two-time NSCAA All-American and cored eight goals and tallied 14 assists in 2005. Sa Freire helped his team to a regional championship and second place finish nationally in 2003.

Strickland comes from Davis, California where he played at Davis Senior High School. He was a two-year letterwinner who captained the team both seasons. A two-time All-Monticello Empire League selection, he was the MEL MVP in '05 when he led Davis the section championship. Bishop hails from Riverside, Missouri where he attended Park Hill South High School. A four-year letterwinner who was a 2006 NSCAA Youth All-American and two-time Missouri first-team All-State selection. He was the '06 Missouri Western Regional Player of the Year as well.

Montgomery is from Bakersfield, California where he was a four-year letterwinner at Centennial High School (graduated in 2004). He was an all-league and all-area selection. Huston-Ringstrom graduated from Corono del Mar in Newport Beach, California in 2004 where he was a first-team All-CIF selection in '04. He was tabbed team MVP his senior year as well.

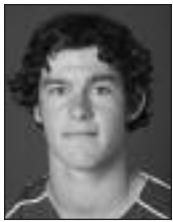

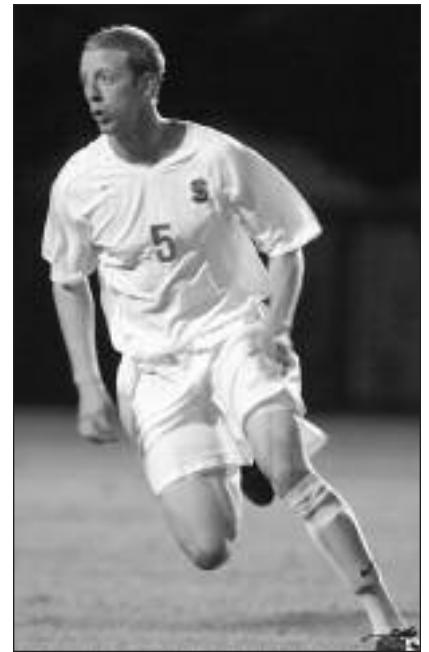

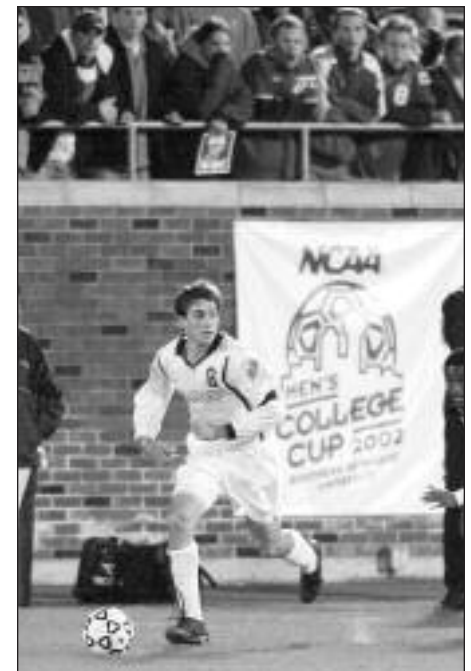

# Maloney Field Home of Championship Soccer



Maloney Field has been the venue for a number of international and professional soccer events.

Maloney Field serves as home to the Stanford men's and women's soccer programs. Completed in 1997, the field has also played host to numerous collegiate, professional and international events, including the Women's World Cup in the summer of 1999, when Maloney Field was used as a practice field.

Phase I of the renovation was completed in 1997, and included the upgrade of the playing surface and the installation of temporary seating. The 115' X 76' game field is adjacent to practice fields measuring 160' X 120'.

The second phase of the upgrade was completed during the 1998 season. Phase II featured the installation of 80-foot high light poles around the perimeter of the field, making it possible to host night competition in accordance to NCAA stan-

dards. The lights are part of Musco Light's top of the line TLC (Total Light Control) system. Permanent seating was also installed on the west side of the field, increasing the capacity to approximately 2,000 spectators. The bleachers are precast concrete in two sections, with an entry plaza between them. A new Daktronics scoreboard and message center were also added to complete the field. Enhanced landscaping and completing of Maloney Plaza link the facility to the rest of the Stanford Sports Complex.

Since the renovation of the facility, Stanford has been selected to host the second, third and quarterfinal NCAA Tournament matches in 2002 and 2001; first, second and third round matches in 2000, first and second round matches in 1998, and 2001, and a first round match in 1999. Temporary bleachers were added, and the games drew large crowds to watch some of the best teams in collegiate soccer compete.

Since the 1997 season, the Cardinal men have posted a 58-19-6 (.756) record in the facility, while the women have compiled a 51-17-5 (.733) mark.

Maloney Field has also been the venue for the U.S. National Teams, a number of international and professional soccer events, the Mexican Women's National Team and the local San Jose Earthquakes of Major League Soccer.

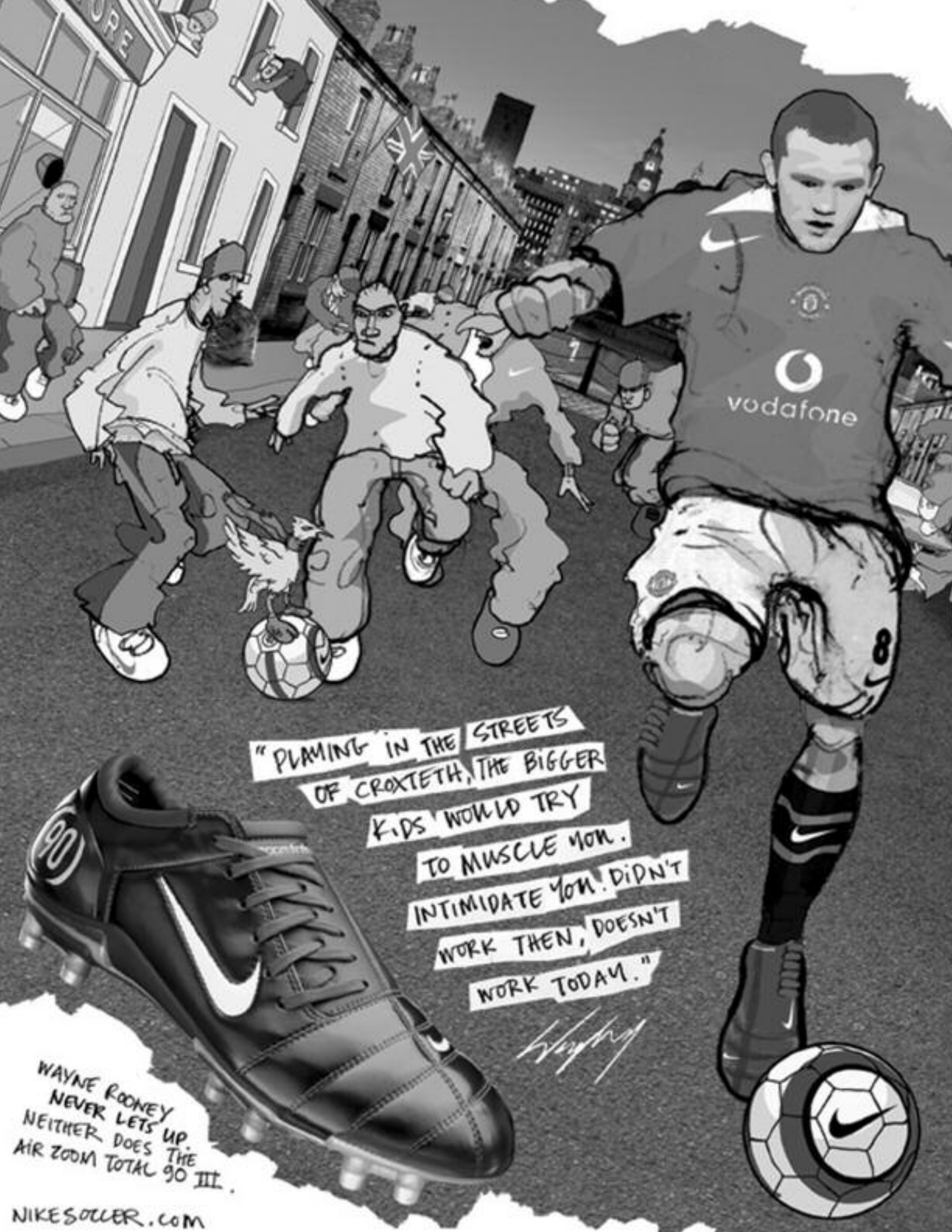

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university

drew students from all over the country: many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months – housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East – the first year foretold greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."



## Stanford University The University at a Glance



### Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

More than one hundred years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanfords' generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

### Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is an hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few miles north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, sports facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The university is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories – including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth – where faculty from a wide range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Paris, Kyoto, Santiago, Berlin, Oxford, Florence, and Moscow.

### Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty – which numbers approximately 1,700 – is one of the most distinguished in the nation. It includes 16 Nobel laureates, 4 Pulitzer Prize winners, 21 National Medal of Science winners, 132 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 223 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, 80 members of the National Academy of Engineering, and 23 members of the National Academy of Education. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.

Currently 13,900 students, of which 6,500 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. About 40 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 100 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, 44 percent are African American, Asian American, Hispanic or Native American. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished. Approximately 10 students apply to Stanford for every place in the freshman class. Eighty-four Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars, 66 have been named Marshall Scholars, and 48 have been named Truman Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of graduating seniors plan to attend graduate or professional schools. Stanford students also shine in a tremendous array of activities outside the classroom – from student government to music, theater, and journalism. Through the Haas Center for Public Service, students participate in dozens of community service activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 35 Division I varsity sports – equally divided between men's and women's teams. Of Stanford's 104 national team titles, 52 have been captured since 1990, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's athletes and coaches participated in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, 49 competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Games, 34 represented Stanford at the 2000 Games in Sydney – by far the most of any university in the nation – and 42 Stanford athletes competed at the 2004 Games in Athens. Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 9,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

### Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, "... Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care." Her thoughts echo in the words of former Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, "The true university must reinvent itself every day. . . . At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks – teaching, learning, and research."

Surrounded by three sides of the Pacific Ocean and San Francisco Bay, San Francisco's compact 46 square miles crowd the tip of the San Francisco Peninsula. "The City" has a population of 730,000 and is the centerpiece of the San Francisco Bay Area, which is the nation's fifth largest metropolitan region and registers a population of over six million and hosts over 16 million visitors each year.

The City is a cultural wonderland, an ethnic treasure chest where custom, tradition and history are preserved, celebrated and shared. From the vibrant counterculture in Haight-Ashbury to the young and glamorous tech survivors in their South of Market lofts, San Francisco is a golden dream come true.

Visitors and residents of San Francisco have a playground of diversity at their fingertips. Fisherman's Wharf, a must-see for all, includes waterfront marketplaces such as PIER 39, The Cannery and Ghirardelli Square. Golden Gate Park, Chinatown, North Beach, Union Square, Pacific Bell Park, the Embarcadero Center and, world famous cable cars and trolleys are just an example of what The City has to offer. The Golden Gate Bridge, San Francisco's signature landmark, looms as the gateway to the City by the Bay.

To the south of Stanford are Santa Clara and San Jose, the anchors to the Silicon Valley. Computer firms and software companies can be found throughout the region, which is considered the leader among the world's high technology industry. Lest you think that the valley is all business, though, spend a day at Paramount's Great America, delve into the wonders of technology at the Tech Museum of Innovation or explore the Winchester Mystery House.

One of the world's great stretches of coastline is located within a short drive from Stanford University. To the south is the Monterey Peninsula, which includes the picturesque coastal towns of Monterey, Carmel and Santa Cruz. The Monterey Bay Aquarium, Cannery Row and 17-Mile Drive along Pebble Beach are musts for visitors.

And if you bring your golf clubs, some of the most famous golf courses can be found on the Monterey Peninsula, including Pebble Beach, Spyglass Hill and Cypress Point. The Beach Boardwalk, which features a historic wooden roller coaster, is located along the coast in Santa Cruz.

Further north along the coast is Half Moon Bay, Princeton-by-the-Bay, San Francisco and Marin County, located just across the Golden Gate Bridge. A short ferryboat ride past Alcatraz Island are the coastal towns of Tiburon, Larkspur and Sausalito.

A short drive north and east of Marin County gets you into the Napa Wine Country, home to dozens of well-known vintners. Within a few hours drive from the Bay Area is Lake Tahoe, home to some of the finest skiing in the country.

The Bay Area is also a mecca for some of the finest sports organizations in the nation. The Bay Area has two professional football teams (San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders), two professional baseball teams (San Francisco Giants, Oakland A's), one professional basketball team (Golden State Warriors) and one professional hockey team (San Jose Sharks)

Whether it's a cosmopolitan atmosphere, the cultural offerings of one of the great cities in the world, a visit to a coastal location, a trip to the Wine Country or skiing at Lake Tahoe, the San Francisco Bay Area remains one of the great destinations in the world today.

## Stanford Athletics Home of Champions

“Home of Champions.” Those are the bywords for the Stanford University Athletic Department.

And for good reason. No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished since the 1980’s. NCAA team champions. NCAA individual champions. Olympic medalists. Stanford University athletes have been all over the world capturing championships.

The statistics speak for themselves: Stanford University has won 75 NCAA team championships since 1980, the most in the nation; Cardinal athletes have won 52 NCAA championships since 1990 – again the most in the nation. Stanford has brought home 31 NCAA championship trophies the past eight years, including an unprecedented six NCAA team titles in 1996-97. In 1991-92, Stanford athletes took home 29 individual NCAA titles – an NCAA record. Cardinal athletes won 21 individual championships during the 1992-93 season, the second most in history.

Even more impressive is Stanford’s string of 12 consecutive Directors’ Cup titles (1995-2006). The award honors the nation’s top overall athletic program and with 12 straight victories in the competition, it is no wonder Stanford is considered the dominant athletic program in the nation.

Stanford captured its 12th straight Directors’ Cup in 2005-06. The Cardinal won a total of three national team crowns (two NCAA) in synchronized swimming (U.S. Collegiate), women’s tennis and women’s cross country. Stanford had a total of 20 Top 10 finishes with men’s water polo, women’s basketball, men’s swimming, women’s swimming, men’s gymnastics, women’s indoor track, men’s crew, women’s sailing, men’s tennis and women’s water polo joining the national champions in the Top Five. The Cardinal also picked up six individual national titles (two NCAA) and 13 team conference championships.

Stanford has now won at least one NCAA team championship for 30 straight years. Cardinal teams have also won four or more NCAA team titles in a single year nine times, an NCAA best.

All totaled, Stanford has won 104 collegiate team titles (92 NCAA championships) and 395 NCAA individual titles. Cardinal

women have won an NCAA-best 35 team championships while men’s teams have captured 57 NCAA team titles, third-best in the nation. Overall, Stanford’s 92 NCAA team championships rank second in the nation.

In the last 10 years (since 1996-97), Stanford has claimed 33 national team championships and 29 NCAA team titles – the best in the country.

The best athletic year in school history arguably came in 1996-97 when Cardinal teams set an NCAA record by winning six NCAA team championships in a single academic year: men’s and women’s cross country; men’s and women’s volleyball; and

men's and women's tennis. Nine other teams finished in the Top Four nationally, including second-place finishes in women's swimming, men's swimming, men's water polo and women's synchronized swimming. Stanford also posted third-place finishes in women's basketball, baseball and fencing, as well as fourth place finishes in women's golf and women's water polo. In addition, the Stanford co-ed sailing team added a ICYRA national championship.

The 1996-97 school year also saw the Cardinal football team advance to the Sun Bowl, the women's basketball team return to the Final Four, the baseball team qualify for the College World Series and the men's basketball team advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since it won the 1942 NCAA title.

Not only has the Cardinal won an NCAA record six NCAA team championships in a single season (1996-97), but it has also won five NCAA titles in a single year on three occasions: 1991-92, '94-95 and '97-98. Cardinal teams have won four championships in a single academic year on five occasions: 1985-86, '86-87, '92-93, '93-94 and 2001-02.

Stanford has won 186 conference or regional titles since 1991, again the best in the country. Cardinal teams won a record 18 conference or regional championships in 1998-99 – by far the best performance of any school in the nation.



The Stanford women's basketball team has been a consistent top finisher in the Pac-10, advancing well into the NCAA tournament for years.

Another memorable moment came in 1999-2000 when the Cardinal football, men's basketball and baseball teams won at least a share of their respective Pac-10 titles for the first time in school history.

Stanford has simply dominated in several sports. The Cardinal men's tennis team has won 17 NCAA titles while the women's squad has hauled in 16 national titles. Other programs to have brought in at least five national titles include men's water polo (11), women's swimming (9), men's swimming (8), men's golf (7) and women's volleyball (6).

Stanford has also enjoyed unequaled success in Olympic competition. Stanford was represented by 43 affiliates at the most recent Olympic Games that took place in 2004 in Athens, Greece. The Cardinal totaled 17 medals (three gold, seven silver, seven bronze).

At the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia, Stanford was represented by a total of 34 athletes and coaches. The Cardinal contingent won a total of 10 medals – four gold, three silver and three bronze.

At the 1996 Games in Atlanta, Stanford placed 49 coaches and athletes on Olympic teams, including three head United States Olympic coaches (Tara VanDerveer, women's basketball; Richard

Quick, women's swimming; Skip Kenney, men's swimming). Stanford athletes accounted for 16 gold medals, one silver and one bronze in Atlanta.

At the 1992 Games in Barcelona, Cardinal athletes earned 19 medals – 10 gold, four silver and five bronze. If Stanford were a country, it would've placed 13th in the world with its 19 medals and ninth with 10 golds. Thirty-eight Stanford-affiliated athletes and coaches participated in Barcelona while 41 members of the Cardinal family took part in the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

Olympic gold medalists are numerous on The Farm. Former Cardinal standout Bob Mathias won back-to-back Olympic decathlon gold medals in 1948 and '52, while swimmers Pablo Morales, Jenny Thompson, Summer Sanders, Janet Evans and Misty Hyman have become household names in the swimming world.

Morales, who helped Stanford win three straight NCAA team championships (1985-87), won three medals at the 1984 Games in Los Angeles (one gold, two silver) and two more gold medals at the 1992 Games in Barcelona. Evans won three golds in the 1988 Games in Seoul, and one gold and one silver in Barcelona, while Sanders won four medals in Barcelona; two gold, one silver and one bronze. Thompson is the most decorated athlete in Olympic history with 12 medals (eight gold, three silver, one bronze). Hyman added her name to the list of Stanford swimming greats by winning the 2000 Olympic gold medal in the 200 meter butterfly to pull off one of the biggest upsets of the Sydney Olympiad.

A list of the great student-athletes in the history of Stanford Athletics would be difficult to even come close to compiling but a few of the great names in the amazing history of Stanford Athletics include Tom Watson and Tiger Woods (golf); Tim Mayotte, John McEnroe and Roscoe Tanner (men's tennis); Keri Walsh, Ogonna Nnamani, Kim Oden and Logan Tom (women's volleyball); Jack McDowell and Mike Mussina (baseball); Julie Foudy (women's soccer); Hank Luisetti, Brevin Knight and Mark Madsen (men's basketball); Jennifer Azzi, Nicole Powell and Kate Starbird (women's basketball); Tony Azevedo (men's water polo); Jim Plunkett, John Elway and Troy Walters (football); Debi Thomas (figure skating); Eric Heiden (speed skating) and the great Ernie Nevers (football); just to name a few.

It's no wonder Stanford University is often referred to as the "NCAA's Champion of Champions."

Stanford University captured its 12th consecutive NCAA Division I Directors' Cups in 2005-06. The award is presented annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) to the best overall collegiate athletic program in the country.

The Cardinal won three national team championships in 2005-06 (synchronized swimming, women's tennis, women's cross country), while a total of 13 teams finished among the Top five nationally and 19 teams placed in the Top 10.

Stanford teams finishing in the Top 10 were synchronized swimming (1st), women's tennis (1st), women's cross country (1st), men's water polo (2nd), women's indoor track (2nd), men's swimming (3rd), men's gymnastics (3rd), men's crew (3rd), women's water polo (3rd), women's sailing (4th), women's basketball (5th), women's swimming (5th), men's tennis (5th), men's cross country (6th), men's fencing (7th), women's fencing (7th), co-ed sailing (8th), women's lacrosse (9th), baseball (9th) and softball (9th).

Developed as a joint effort between *USA Today* and NACDA, the Sports Academy Directors' Cup is the only all-sports competition that recognizes the institution in each of the four categories with the best overall athletics program.

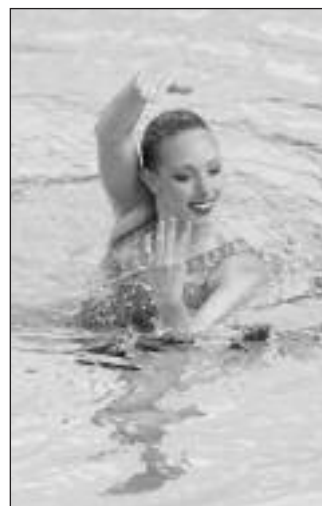

# Stanford's National Titles Home of Champions

The Stanford women's tennis team has won a record 15 out of 25 possible NCAA titles since 1982.

Two in a row for the baseball team as coach Mark Marquess guided Stanford to College World Series titles in 1987 and 1988.

NCAA championships are commonplace at Stanford University. Cardinal teams have won NCAA championships at an unprecedented rate, including a national-best 75 since 1980 and 52 titles since 1990. Stanford has won at least one NCAA team championship for 30 consecutive years and has won at least four national titles in a single season nine times – again an NCAA best.

Stanford has won 18 national titles in men's tennis, 16 in women's tennis, 11 in men's water polo, nine in women's swimming, eight in men's swimming and seven in men's golf, among others. Nineteen Cardinal teams have won national championships.

Stanford Athletics has won 104 national championships. In NCAA competition, Cardinal teams have won 92 team titles, including 57 men's championships and an NCAA-best 35 women's titles.
