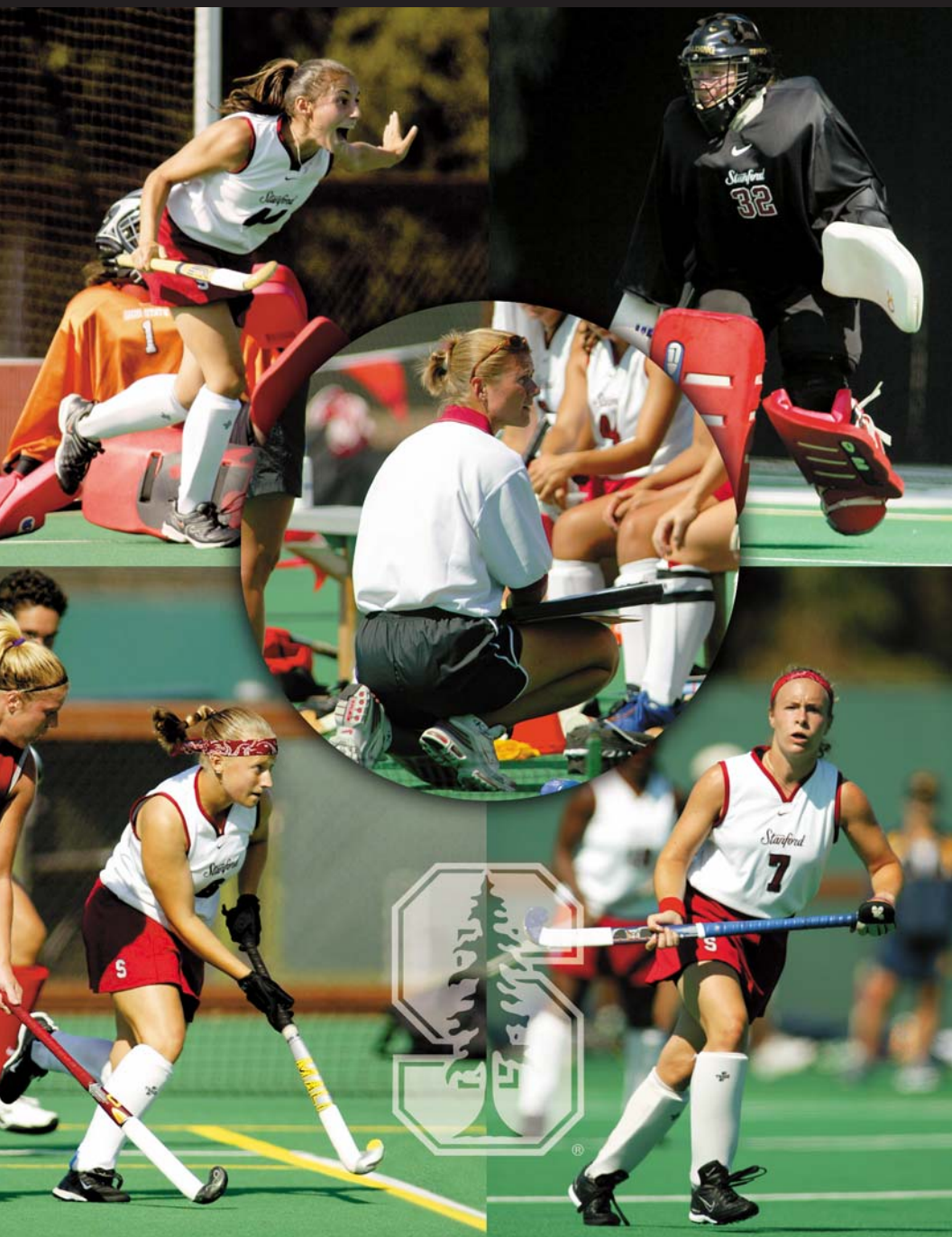
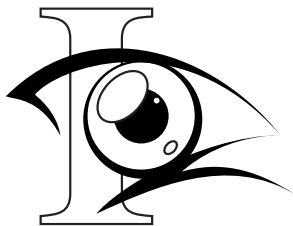

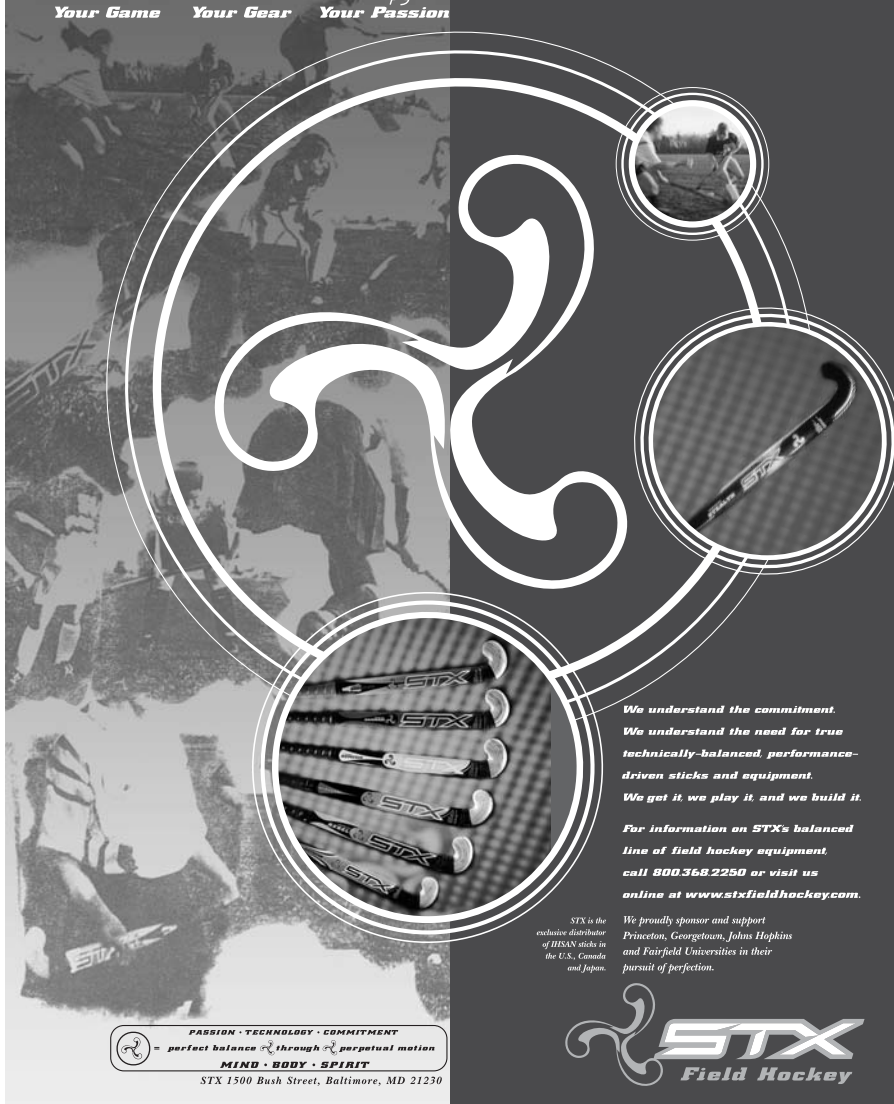

2003 SEASON OUTLOOK



The 2003 Stanford field hockey team will be composed of an exciting blend of returning veterans and a strong freshman class. Lesley Irvine takes over the head coaching reigns from 18-year veteran Sheryl Johnson and will look to get the Cardinal back into the NCAA Tournament.

"Sheryl and I have the same philosophy so the transition has gone really smooth so far," said Irvine. "The Stanford field hockey program has always combined a strong desire to win with a sense of community. I plan to continue with that tradition."

With just three Division I field hockey teams in California, Stanford plays in the NorPac Conference designed exclusively for the sport with local teams California and Pacific, as well as five other schools east of the Missouri River. The winner of the conference's tournament annually hosts an NCAA Play-In Game versus the champion of another conference with the Play-In winner advancing to the 16-team NCAA Tournament field. Stanford has reached the finals of the NorPac Tournament in all five years since its inception in 1998 and has won the event twice but reached the NCAA Tournament only once in 2000.

"We played some great games last year but didn't come out ahead on the scoreboard as many times as we should have," said Irvine, in reference to the Cardinal handily outscoring (40-33) and outshooting (332-182) its opponents despite a record one game under .500 a year ago. "The focus this season will be to play well in key spots and pick up the win on the scoreboard, not just outplay our opponents."

Stanford will return six starters and nine letterwinners from last year's club that finished 10-11 overall and 4-2 in NorPac competition, while placing second in both the regular season West Division league standings and the conference tournament. However, the club must find a way to replace four graduated All-NorPac selections in Amanda Billmyer, Amrit Chima, Christina Williams and Tysie Sawyer, as well as three of its top four scorers (Billmyer, Chima, Williams).

Co-captains and forwards Noor Dawood and Keely Machmer-Wessels lead a senior class that will be expected to step up to help the Cardinal improve. Dawood is the team's active career leader in goals (12), assists (seven) and points (31), and is expected to be one of the primary offensive threats. She started all 21 games last year, ranking tied for third on the team with 16 points (six goals, four assists) and leading the Cardinal with four game-winning goals. Machmer-Wessels contributed seven points in her first full season as a starter in 2002. Goalkeeper Emily Zander and defender Dani Guernsey give the Cardinal a couple of experienced seniors to fit into the team's defensive equation. Zander started 20 of the team's 21 games last season while splitting time in the net with Ana Kralovec, taking part in six shutouts and ranking second among NFHCA goalkeepers with a 1.65 GAA. Guernsey started 15 games on defense.

2003 SEASON OUTLOOK

"We will rely on our senior class to take an aggressive role this season," said Irvine. "We need them to perform solidly and instill in a talented freshman group the pride of Stanford Field Hockey."

Midfielder Eleanor Morgan and forward Molly Melcher are the team's only juniors. Morgan is an exciting player who is looking forward to a breakout year after ranking fifth on the club with 10 points on a pair of goals and a co-team-leading six assists a year ago, while Melcher scored her first career goal in 2002 and appeared in 16 games off the bench.

All four of the team's sophomores made significant contributions in their rookie year of 2002 and hold promise to develop into an outstanding class. Midfielder Missy Halliday, who contributed four points on a goal and two assists while starting all 21 games last season, has already raised eyebrows and established herself as one of the top young players in the conference. Goalkeeper Ana Kralovec played in 15 games a year ago and led the team with a 1.34 GAA, taking part in all six of Stanford's shutouts while splitting time with Zander in the net. Kralovec was twice named the NorPac Rookie of the Week. Defender Tammy Shuer (17 GP/2 GS, 1 G, 2 P) and forward/midfielder Lyndsay Erickson (15 GP/1 GS, 3 A) also saw significant action.

The Cardinal hopes that an exciting and large freshman group that makes up eight of the 18 players on the team's roster will contribute immediately. Midfielder/forward Cara-Lynn Lopresti (Carmel Valley, CA/Torrey Pines HS), a member of the Under-20 National Team and a USFHA "A" camp selection leads a group that also includes a pair of other talented San Diego-area players in midfielder Shannon Donahue (San Diego, CA/Scripps Ranch HS) and defender Aska Sturdevan (Encinitas, CA/San Dieguito Academy). Midfielder/forward Katherine Brooks (Dallas, TX/Hockaday School), defender/midfielder Julia Drewes (Hockessin, DE/St. Mark's HS), midfielder/defender Jamie Hais (St. Louis, MO/John Burroughs HS), defender/midfielder Ellen Hunter (Louisville, KY/Louisville Collegiate School) and forward Liz Robinson (Alton, IL/Villa Duchesne HS) complete the rookie class.

"We're going to be a pretty young group," conceded Irvine. "We have some good players coming back, but we will need some of the players from this talented freshman class to make an immediate impact. This is a great freshman group that will really help our program. None of them lack confidence and all of them should contribute significantly to our program at some point."

"I want to have a very open mind about this year's personnel," continued Irvine. "We'll adjust our system based on the players we have on our roster, and will have a lot of options as to where we play people and who we play. I really believe the team will continue to develop throughout the season and will have improved tremendously by the time we finish the year."



COACHING STAFF

Lesley Irvine

Head Coach

Lesley Irvine begins her first season as the head coach of the Stanford field hockey program in 2003. After two years as an assistant coach for the Cardinal, Irvine officially took over the reigns of the team when Sheryl Johnson retired after 18 seasons in December of 2002.

"I am so excited by the incredible opportunity I have been given," said Irvine after her hiring. "The support everyone has shown has been wonderful. Sheryl Johnson has been an amazing mentor and role model for me. It has been an honor and privilege to work with such an incredible person and this program over the past two seasons. I approach the future with an abundance of energy, and I am totally committed to driving this team forward. I look forward to developing the level of excellence that is consistent in this program, as well as maintaining the unique philosophy that epitomizes Stanford Field Hockey."

A native of England, Irvine followed a standout field hockey career overseas by playing one season of collegiate field hockey in her first year as a graduate student at Iowa in the fall of 1999. Irvine led the Hawkeyes to the NCAA semifinals and a Big Ten championship by leading the team with 47 points (17 goals, 13 assists). Irvine was named to the Final Four and Big Ten All-Tournament teams, and was also a Second Team Regional All-American.

Irvine played three years of field hockey for Loughborough University in England, winning a total of five national championships (three outdoor, two indoor). She also was selected to play for the England Under-18 and Under-21 National Teams during her playing career overseas.

"I have tremendous confidence in Lesley Irvine and know that as my successor she will carry on the Stanford Field Hockey traditions," said Johnson.

"We have quickly learned that Lesley Irvine is a very special coach who is ready to lead her own program," emphasized Stanford Athletic Director Dr. Ted Leland. "We have confidence in Lesley building upon the high standards that have been set for the Stanford Field Hockey team."



Justine Sowry

Assistant Coach

Justine Sowry starts her first season as an assistant coach for the Stanford field hockey program in 2003. Sowry has spent the last five campaigns (1998-2002) as an assistant field hockey coach at Louisville, where she worked primarily with the goalkeepers.

"We are thrilled to have Justine join our coaching staff," said Stanford head coach Lesley Irvine when Sowry was hired in June of 2003. "She has an outstanding and extensive coaching and playing background that will bring excellent new ideas and insights to our program. She is an extremely passionate coach who will undoubtedly become an integral part of Stanford Field Hockey."

Sowry has also been the Assistant Director for field hockey camps at Louisville over the past three summers (2001-03) and has taught at various goalkeeping elite clinics since 1993.

The Australian native was a member of the Australian National Hockey Team from 1991-2001. She earned a total of 128 international caps, and was a member of the country's 1996 and 2000 Olympic squads. She earned gold medals while playing on World Cup teams in 1994 and 1998.

Sowry earned a Bachelor's degree in Education from the University of South Australia in 1991.



Christina Williams

Volunteer Assistant Coach

Former Stanford player Christina Williams begins her first season as a volunteer assistant coach in 2003.

Williams finished an outstanding four-year playing career last season with a stellar campaign, earning First Team All-NorPac, Second Team All-Region and All-NorPac Tournament honors. Williams finished her career with 38 points on 12 goals and 14 assists.

She is scheduled to graduate from Stanford after the 2003 fall quarter with a Bachelor's degree in Human Biology.

#44 Noor Dawood

Forward

Cardinal Career: Stanford's active career leader in goals (12), assists (seven) and points (31), playing in 63 games and making 55 starts during her first three seasons. Two-time NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Junior in 2002: Led the team with four game-winning goals, while ranking tied for third with 16 points on six goals and four assists. Started all 21 games. Scored a dramatic game-winner in a 1-0 overtime win in the season-opener versus Ohio State (8/31). Also had game-winners versus Rutgers (9/3), Albany (9/5) and in the NorPac Tournament semifinals versus Radford (11/8). Named NorPac All-Tournament and NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Sophomore in 2001: Scored four points (two goals) in 19 games and 12 starts. Named NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Freshman in 2000: Had a productive rookie collegiate season with 11 points (four goals, three assists). Played in 23 games with 22 starts. Scored the game-winning goal in a 1-0 win over Penn (10/14). Had a goal and an assist in 5-2 win over Pacific (10/28).

High School: 2000 graduate of Western Reserve Academy, Hudson, OH. A two-time All-State player. Team captain and league MVP. Also was a two-time All-American in lacrosse (1999, 2000).

As a Freshman in 2000: Contributed four points on a pair of goals, playing in 18 games with one start.

Earned Second Team All-American honors as a senior and was a three-year All-Conference choice for a prep team that was undefeated in four years of high school action and captured four league titles. Forward

Cardinal Career: Has contributed 10 points (three goals, four assists) in 41 games and 23 starts during her first three seasons. Three-time NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Junior in 2002: Ranked sixth on the team in scoring with seven points, contributing a pair of goals and three assists. Had a team single-game season-high and career individual-high three assists at Saint Louis (10/4).

As a Sophomore in 2001: Played in eight games with one start. Named NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Freshman in 2000: Scored three points (one goal, one assist) in 12 games and one start. First collegiate goal came in a 7-0 win over Saint Louis (11/2). NFHCA All-Academic.

High School: 2000 graduate of Cleveland Heights High School, Cleveland Heights, OH. Team MVP and co-captain. First Team All-League selection. Honored as an All-Ohio All-Star. #32 Emily Zander

Goalkeeper

Cardinal Career: Has a 1.43 career GAA, allowing only 23 goals in 1127:65 minutes. Has added a 9-7 record and 63 career saves. Two-time NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Junior in 2002: Played in 20 games, all starts, and 934:17 minutes. Recorded an 8-7 record and took part in all six Stanford shutouts while splitting time in the net. Had a season-high eight of her 50 saves versus Kent State (9/15). Posted a 1.65 GAA, second among regular NorPac goalkeepers. Named NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Sophomore in 2001: Played in a pair of games and recorded shutouts in both contests, including her first career start at Indiana (9/7). Credited with the victory in a 1-0 penalty stroke win over Indiana (9/7) after playing all 70 regulation minutes. Totaled 88:10 minutes for the season without giving up a goal. Recorded three saves and posted a 1.000 save percentage. Named NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Freshman in 2000: Played in six games, coming up with 10 saves and allowing just one goal for an 0.66 GAA. Credited with five shutouts, all while sharing goalkeeper duties with Rebecca Shapiro. Picked up 10 saves and recorded a .909 save percentage.

High School: 2000 graduate of Monta Vista High School (alma mater of former Stanford head coach Sheryl Johnson), Cupertino, CA. Named the team's Most Valuable Defensive Player all four years. Named First Team and Honorable Mention by the *San Jose Mercury News* in 1998 and 1999, respectively.

Other Amateur Field Hockey: 1998 Junior Olympian. USFHA National Futures participant (1997-99) and National Futures Tournament selectee (1998). Won a Junior Olympics bronze medal in 1998.

Personal: Human Biology major. Born February 8, 1982. Daughter of Andrew and Sandie Zander. Father was the captain of the wrestling team at Illinois as a collegiate student-athlete.

VARSITY FIELD HOCKEY TURF

Stanford field hockey begins its sixth season on the Varsity Field Hockey Turf this fall. The field was made possible by numerous donations, including generous contributions by the Levinson Family. The field is one of the top facilities in the country and is considered the premier playing field in the NorPac Conference. Measuring over 110,000 square feet, the field is constructed of top of the line synthetic turf.

#9 Eleanor Morgan

Midfield

Cardinal Career: Has scored 16 points (four goals, eight assists) and played in 35 games with 28 starts during her first two seasons. Two-time NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Sophomore in 2002: Ranked fifth on the club in scoring with 10 points (two goals, co-team-leading six assists). Had a huge NorPac Tournament, picking up a pair of assists in the opener versus Davidson (11/7) before scoring her first two goals of the season with one each in the semifinals versus Radford (11/8) and the finals against California (11/9). Named NFHCA All-Academic.

As a Freshman in 2001: Scored six points (two goals, two assists) in 14 games and seven starts. Named NorPac Rookie of the Week (10/23). Scored both of her goals versus Fairfield (9/1). Named NFHCA All-Academic.

High School: 2001 graduate of Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School, Silver Springs, MD. Earned numerous honors in her senior season, including All-American, All-State, All-County, All-South Region and Academic All-American selections. Prep squad won three consecutive state titles (1998, '99, 2000); part of what is now a national and state record current streak of nine straight state prep championships. Scored 75 points in her final two prep campaigns (28 goals, 19 assists). A two-time All-County choice. Also a four-year standout in lacrosse and indoor track. Part of a 400 yard relay team that set a school record. A national Merit Finalist and a Maryland Distinguished Scholar. Graduated in the top 1% of her class and earned several academic honors.

Other Amateur Field Hockey: Selected to the USFHA A-Camp in December of 2000. USFHA Futures participant (1998-2001) that was selected to the National Futures Tournament each year.

Personal: Product Design major. Born April 16, 1983. Daughter of Craig and Sing-huen Morgan. Sister, Elise, was an All-American field hockey player at Stanford, finishing her collegiate career in 1995.

Coaching Staff on Morgan: "Eleanor has some of the best stick work on the team. Her vision and distribution skills will be key for us this year."

#34 Lyndsay Erickson

Forward/Midfield

As a Freshman in 2002: Played in 15 games with one start, contributing three assists. Scored first career collegiate point when she assisted on a Tysie Sawyer goal versus Albany (9/5). Named NFHCA All-Academic.

High School: 2002 graduate of Los Gatos High School, Los Gatos, CA. A First Team All-Section choice as a senior and a First Team All-League selection in her final two prep seasons. Moved from defense to center midfield as a senior and responded with 18 points (seven goals, four assists). Team was a section finalist in senior year, while sophomore team won section title. A section finalist in the triple jump in her senior year. School's Female Athlete of the Year for 2000-01. Earned several high school academic honors and finished with a 4.3 overall GPA, graduating in the top 5% of her class.

2002 SEASON REVIEW



Stanford reached the finals of the NorPac Tournament for a fifth straight year in 2002, only to fall one victory shy of reaching the NCAA Tournament. With a chance to host an NCAA Play-In Game on the line, Stanford won its first two games of the NorPac Tournament hosted by the Cardinal over East Division foes Davidson (3-1) and Radford (3-2). However, Stanford fell to arch-rival California (2-1, OT) in the championship contest. The Cardinal finished the regular season with a 10-11 overall mark, marking its third straight year with double-digit victories, and placed second in the NorPac West Division with a 4-2 conference record.

Stanford started the campaign with three straight victories, including a dramatic 1-0 overtime win over 2001 NCAA Tournament participant Ohio State in the season-opener. The Cardinal also opened up its NorPac schedule with a 4-0 mark after sweeping a pair of games from both Pacific and Saint Louis. Stanford's toughest stretches of the season came with a 2-5 record on its annual early-season East Coast road trip, as well as a three-game losing streak that began in mid-October and included a pair of 2-1 losses to NorPac champion California. In fact, each of Stanford's final eight losses were by a single goal.

Stanford was paced by four senior players that each earned All-NorPac honors for the first time in 2002. Amanda Billmyer, Amrit Chima and Christina Williams were all First Team selections, while Tysie Sawyer was a Second Team choice and also earned Defensive Player of the Year honors in the NorPac's West Division. Williams and Sawyer both added Second Team All-Regional and All-NorPac Tournament honors. Billmyer led the team and finished third in the conference with a career-high 23 points (10 goals, three assists). Chima (20 points — eight goals, four assists) and Williams (16 points — five goals, six assists) also added career-high points totals, while Sawyer picked up six points (three goals) and a pair of defensive saves. Chima added team-highs in defensive saves (five) and penalty strokes (two). Junior Noor Dawood (16 points — six goals, four assists), also an All-NorPac Tournament choice, scored more points than she had combined for in her first two seasons (15) and led the club with four game-winning goals, while junior Emily Zander's 1.65 GAA ranked second in the conference. Zander shared time in the net with freshman Ana Kralovec, who actually recorded a 1.34 GAA but did not have enough minutes to rank among the league leaders. Sophomore Eleanor Morgan contributed 10 points, while freshman Missy Halliday started all 21 matches and solidified the team's defensive midfield.

As a team, Stanford ranked second in the NorPac by averaging 1.90 goals per game. Defensively, the Cardinal allowed 1.57 goals per contest and recorded six shutouts.

"We had some great matches in 2002," summarized new head coach Lesley Irvine, noting that 12 of the team's last 14 contests were decided by a single goal. "It was heartbreaking to lose to California in overtime at the finals of the NorPac Tournament and have the season end so close to making the NCAA Tournament, but the players did everything we asked of them all season long."

The completion of the 2002 season also marked the end of an illustrious career for Sheryl Johnson, who retired after 18 seasons as the team's head coach. Johnson, who was selected to coach in the 2002 NFCA All-Star Game held at the Final Four last November, led the Cardinal to nine NorPac titles and seven NCAA Tournament appearances while on The Farm. She was named NorPac Coach of the Year eight times and posted a 168-125-11 career record.

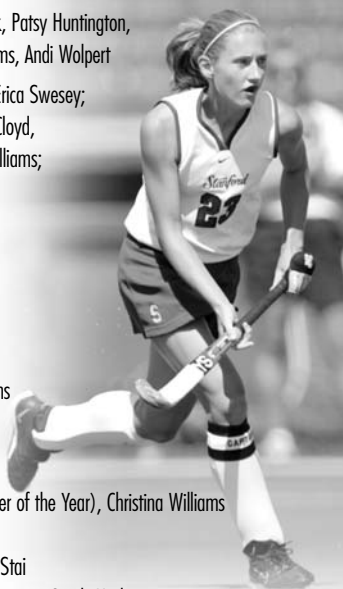

About the University

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew students from all over the country: many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months—housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East—the first year foretold greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."

Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

More than one hundred years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanfords' generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is an hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few miles north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, sports facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty—which numbers approximately 1,700—is one of the most distinguished in the nation. It includes 17 Nobel laureates, four Pulitzer Prize winners, 21 National Medal of Science winners, 124 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 219 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, 83 members of the National Academy of Engineering, and 24 members of the National Academy of Education. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.



STANFORD ATHLETICS—HOME OF CHAMPIONS

“Home of Champions.”

Those are the bywords for the Stanford University Athletic Department.

And for good reason. No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished since the 1980's. NCAA team champions. NCAA individual champions. Olympic medalists. Stanford University athletes have been all over the world capturing championships.

The statistics speak for themselves

Stanford University has won 68 NCAA team championships since 1980, the most in the nation; Cardinal athletes have won 45 NCAA championships since 1990—again the most in the nation. Stanford has brought home 23 NCAA championship trophies the past seven years, including an unprecedented six NCAA team titles in 1996-97. In 1991-92, Stanford athletes took home 29 individual NCAA titles—an NCAA record. Cardinal athletes won 21 individual championships during the 1992-93 season, the second most in history.

Even more impressive is Stanford's string of nine consecutive Sears Directors' Cup titles (1995-03). The award honors the nation's top overall athletic program and with nine straight #1 finishes, it's no wonder Stanford is considered the dominant athletic program in the nation.

Stanford captured its ninth straight Directors' Cup in 2002-03 with 1420.5 points, winning the honor by 324.5 points over second place Texas. The Cardinal won a total of two NCAA team crowns with championships in men's water polo and cross country. The Cardinal added second place national finishes in baseball, women's volleyball, men's soccer, women's cross country, women's tennis, women's water polo and synchronized swimming. A total of 13 Stanford teams finished among the nation's Top Five, 24 among the Top 10, and 28 among the Top 25. The Cardinal also picked up nine individual NCAA titles and 12 team conference championships.

Stanford has now won at least one NCAA team championship for 26 straight years. Cardinal teams have also won four or more NCAA team titles in a single year nine times, an NCAA best.

All totaled, Stanford has won 95 collegiate team titles (85 NCAA championships) and 376 NCAA individual titles. Cardinal women have won an NCAA-best 29 team championships while men's teams have captured 56 NCAA team titles, third best in the nation. Overall, Stanford's 85 NCAA team championships rank second in the nation.

In the last 10 years (since 1993-94), Stanford has claimed 35 national team championships and 32 NCAA team titles—the best in the country.

Stanford has also enjoyed unequalled success in Olympic competition.

At the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia, Stanford University was represented by a total of 34 athletes and coaches. The Cardinal contingent won a total of 10 medals—four gold, three silver and three bronze. At the 1996 Games in Atlanta, Stanford again placed 49 coaches and athletes on Olympic Teams, accounting for 16 gold medals, one silver and one bronze. Cardinal athletes earned 19 medals (10 gold, four silver, five bronze) during the 1992 Games in Barcelona with 38 Stanford athletes and coaches participating. If Stanford were a country in Barcelona, it would've placed ninth in the world in golds and 13th in overall medals.

Some of the great student-athletes in Stanford history include Tiger Woods and Tom Watson (golf), John McEnroe, Roscoe Tanner and Tim Mayotte (men's tennis), Kim Oden and Kristin Klein (women's volleyball), Kristin Folk (women's basketball/volleyball), Jack McDowell and Mike Mussina (baseball), Julie Foudy (women's soccer), Hank Luisetti, Brevin Knight and Mark Madsen (men's basketball), Jennifer Azzi and Kate Starbird (women's basketball), Jim Plunkett, John Elway and Troy Walters (football), Debi Thomas (figure skating), Eric Heiden (speed skating) and the great Ernie Nevers (football), to name a few.

It's no wonder Stanford University is often referred to as the “NCAA's Champion of Champions.”
