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Stanford University

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Paul Ratcliffe

Head Coach

Head coach Paul Ratcliffe, honored three times as West Coast Conference (WCC) Coach of the Year, begins his third year at the helm of the

Stanford women's soccer program in 2005. Ratcliffe guided the Cardinal to its seventh-straight NCAA Tournament appearance last season, as the squad recorded a 13-6-3 record.

In 2004, Ratcliffe integrated a large class of freshmen with a veteran group of seniors, and the Cardinal posted a fourth-place finish in the Pac-10 and made it to the postseason for the 14th time in the last 15 seasons.

In his first season on The Farm, Ratcliffe faced a tough challenge as the team lost leading scorer Marcie Ward before the season, but he coached Stanford to a 10-9-2 record and a postseason bid.

Prior to arriving at Stanford, Ratcliffe spent five seasons as the head of Saint Mary's women's soccer team, where he led the Gaels to a 55-34-7 overall record, with a 21-13-1 mark in WCC action. In 2001, Ratcliffe had one of his most successful seasons in Moraga and was honored as the WCC Co-Coach of the Year and the NSCAA West Region Coach of the Year. With only one senior in the starting lineup, the Gaels attained the highest national ranking for the program (No. 7), set a school record with a 13-game winning streak and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Before his stint at Saint Mary's, Ratcliffe was an assistant coach at his alma mater, UCLA, from 1994-97. During his tenure with the Bruins, UCLA posted an undefeated 1997 Pac-10 title season and an NCAA Tournament Quarterfinal appearance.



Ratcliffe also served as UCLA's interim head coach from January through August of 1996.

Ratcliffe earned his National "A" License from the United States Soccer Federation in 1999. A 1994 UCLA graduate, Ratcliffe earned his degree in Sociology with a specialization in Business Administration. As a Bruin, he lettered four years at midfield and was a member of the 1990 National Championship team. He tallied 30 points in 73 matches during his career at UCLA.

After finishing his collegiate career, Ratcliffe played professionally in the Continental Indoor Soccer League for the Los Angeles United in 1993 and the Anaheim Splash in 1994. Ratcliffe and his wife, Amy, live in San Jose and have two daughters, three year-old Elena and one year-old Chloe.

Jay Cooney

Assistant Coach

Jay Cooney begins his third year as a member of the Stanford women's soccer staff. Cooney, the Cardinal goalkeeper coach, helped two-time All-American Nicole

Barnhart to another impressive season in her senior campaign last year, as she allowed only 10 goals in 22 games and finished her collegiate career with a school record 0.451 goals-against average.

Cooney came to Stanford after a successful stint as the goalkeeper coach for the San Jose CyberRays of the Women's United Soccer Association. In 2001, the CyberRays defeated the Atlanta Beat to be crowned the inaugural WUSA Champions, and under Cooney's guidance, San Jose goalkeeper LaKeyia Beene was honored as the 2001 WUSA Goalkeeper of the Year.

Prior to his position with the CyberRays, Cooney served as an assistant coach at the College of William & Mary. In Williamsburg, he was also the assistant director of Soccer Plus, a goalkeepers' school owned by Tony DiCicco, WUSA's chief operations officer and coach of the 1999 U.S. Women's World Cup team.

In 1999, Cooney was an assistant coach at Providence College, as well as an assistant coach for the Greater Boston Bolts Under-18 and Under-19 teams. He was the practice goalkeeper for the Boston Bulldogs, a Major League Soccer (MLS) affiliated A-League team.

Before his collegiate coaching career, Cooney was the head coach of Wellesley (Mass.) High School varsity boys' team from 1993-98 and was named Bay State Coach of the Year in 1998.

Cooney is married and lives in San Francisco.

Sarah Kate Noftsinger

Assistant Coach

Sarah Kate Noftsinger is in her second season as an assistant coach for the Cardinal.

Noftsinger arrived on The Farm in May

2004 after spending two seasons as a midfielder and forward for the Washington Freedom. A 2002 Wake Forest graduate, Noftsinger helped the Freedom reach the Founder's Cup finals in 2002 before capturing the championship the next season. She also played in Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) festivals during the summer of 2004.

Noftsinger was a PUMA endorsed athlete for two years and after WUSA suspended operations, she began a stint at PUMA North America, working in product development and athlete marketing.

Noftsinger became the first female Demon Deacon athlete to be drafted by a professional team when she was selected with the No. 22 pick in the 2002 WUSA player draft. A four-year starter at Wake Forest, Noftsinger is still atop the school's record books in game-winning goals and assists. An All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection, she finished her collegiate career tied for the No. 4 ranking in career games played with 81 and is fifth all-time in career games started with 70.

Noftsinger gained coaching experience working with the Gunston-Team America Soccer Club as the Under-9 Boys Premiere Coach and the U-17 Boys Premiere Assistant Coach from 2002-03. She also ran weekly sessions for the Massachusetts Premiere Soccer Club and helped organize clinics for the Washington Freedom Player Development Academy.

Before her arrival in Palo Alto, Noftsinger worked in the marketing department at PUMA North America, where she assisted with athlete marketing and contract negotiation and helped develop advertising for sport campaigns.



Nicole Barnhart

Volunteer Assistant Coach

Nicole Barnhart begins her first year as a volunteer assistant coach at Stanford this fall. Barnhart, a three-

time All-American, is also a member of the U.S. National Team and the first Cardinal to play in goal for the United States.

Barnhart earned her first cap with the National Team last October when she played as a forward against Mexico, marking the first time a U.S. goalie has seen minutes as a field player. In March, she became the first Stanford goalie to ever start in net for the U.S. National Team, posting the first shutout of her post-collegiate career as she led the United States to a 1-0 victory over France at the Algarve Cup. Barnhart collected three saves as the U.S. shut out a talented French team and kept star forward Marinette Pichon off the scoreboard.

Barnhart finished her Stanford career ranked No. 1 in school history with a 0.451 goals-against average in 71 games. She also holds the No. 2 ranking in the Stanford record books with 39 career shutouts and is No. 3 in career saves with 210 in four seasons.

Barnhart graduated with a double degree in Studio Art and Psychology.

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2005 Season Outlook

Stanford poised for another exciting season

The Cardinal returns 13 letter-winners and seven starters, and has nine newcomers joining the squad.

Stanford will look to extend its winning ways this season, as the Cardinal enters its third season under the guidance of head coach Paul Ratcliffe. The Cardinal has won 23 games over the past two years and made its seventh-straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament last fall. With 13 letterwinners and seven starters returning from last year's squad and nine newcomers joining the team, Stanford is poised for another exciting and competitive season.

Although three-time All-American goalkeeper Nicole Barnhart is no longer on the field, she has joined the staff as a volunteer assistant coach while playing for the U.S. National Team. Barnhart will work with third-year assistant Jay Cooney as the team's three keepers challenge each other for the starting spot.

On defense, the team returns seniors Hayley Hunt and Lindsey Hunt, while Martha West was granted her fifth year and will anchor the midfield along with fellow senior Leah Tapscott. Jenny Farenbaugh is returning after missing the last third of her junior campaign with injury and will continue to be a strong force on every part of the field.

The Cardinal will rely on its experienced veterans as well as its freshmen as Stanford boasts one of the most challenging schedules in 2005. The fall slate includes 10 teams that participated in last year's NCAA Tournament, five of whom reached the NCAA Quarterfinals and two of the final-four teams. Nine of the Cardinal's opponents completed the 2004 campaign

ranked in the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA)/adidas poll, including five teams that finished in the top-10: UCLA, Santa Clara, North Carolina, Portland and Washington.

Stanford will jump right into action, as the Cardinal opens the season on the road at Portland. After a pair of games against Bay Area rivals, San Jose State and San Francisco, the Cardinal will head to the USF and Tennessee Tournaments, where Stanford will challenge four teams that finished the 2004 campaign ranked in the top-15. The Cardinal will wrap up its East Coast trip with a match versus the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis. Stanford will return to the Bay Area and close out the non-conference season with the Stanford Nike Invitational, where the Cardinal will host Santa Clara and Colorado College. Stanford will then kick off Pac-10 play as the Cardinal makes a bid for its 15th NCAA appearance.

Here's a look at the 2005 Cardinal squad by position:

Goalkeepers

For the first time in three years, the goalkeeper position is open after Barnhart graduated last spring. Sophomore Erica Holland, freshman Alex Gamble and senior Elizabeth Barnard will compete for the spot.

Holland saw time in three matches last season, tending the goal for 25 minutes and holding her opponents scoreless. She also picked up her first collegiate save against Denver.

Gamble will join the cast of keepers this season graduating from Temecula Valley High School in the spring. She was named First-Team All-CIF as a senior and was the recipient of the 2003 adidas Golden Glove at the USYA National Championship.

Barnard has been a steady contributor for the Cardinal over the past three years, but has seen only four games backing up her predecessor. She has a 0.00 goals-allowed average and has tallied one save in 79 minutes in the net.

"We are lucky to have this solid group of goalkeepers," notes Ratcliffe. "Our assistant coaches Jay Cooney and Nicole Barnhart will work with all three of them, as they challenge each other for the starting spot in the net."

Defenders

Seniors Jenny Farenbaugh, Hayley Hunt and Lindsey Hunt return to the defensive unit that allowed only 17 goals and 167 shots on the year. Lindsey Hunt will make the move to outside back after playing centerback with her twin sister the last two seasons. Junior Rachel Buehler is expected to challenge for a centerback spot along with Hayley Hunt after redshirting last season to play with the U19 World Cup team. Farenbaugh, who missed the last third of the 2004 campaign due to injury, will look to regain her position in the backfield.

Hayley Hunt, a second-team All-American last season, and Lindsey Hunt both started all 22 games last season and helped the Cardinal to 13 shutouts and the best goals-against average in the nation (.432 GAA).

Stanford's defense will also be aided by newcomers Allison Falk, a high school All-American and North Coast Section Player of the Year, and Marissa Abegg, Oregon's Gatorade Player of the Year.

Senior Megan Alderete, who has struggled with injury during her first three seasons, will add extra depth to the Cardinal defense.

"Our defensive unit is very strong and experienced," says Ratcliffe, "They have spent a lot of time playing with each other and they are so instinctive on the field."

Midfielders

Stanford will have tremendous depth at midfield, as senior Leah Tapscott, junior Shari Summers and sophomore Lizzy George all return from last year's squad.

Tapscott is the top-returning scorer from last season's squad, as she tallied five goals and five assists in 2004. Tapscott posted three game-winning goals last season and will look to contribute even more on the scoring front this year.

Summers missed most of her freshman year with injury, but she had a solid sophomore campaign and contributed five points last year. George had an outstanding rookie season and was the third-leading scorer on the team with 11 points on five goals and one assist. George scored her first collegiate goal with the game-winner against Nebraska and added the game-winning goal against Cal Poly in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Sophomore April Wall, who missed six games in the 2004 season with injury, spent the remainder of her freshman campaign at defender.

Also back for the 2005 season are junior Melissa Esparza and sophomore Mimi Yuhas. Esparza, who joined the team last fall, appeared in four games, while Yuhas redshirted her first season. Freshmen Kelley Birch and Austinn Freeman round out the midfield mix, as will both challenge for playing time. Birch was the CIF Player of the Year, while local stand-out Freeman was named the CCS Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

"We have an incredibly deep and talented midfield this fall," comments Ratcliffe. "Our returners gained a lot of experience last season and we have a fantastic group of freshmen coming in. We really expect them to challenge each other, but also form a cohesive group that will work well together."

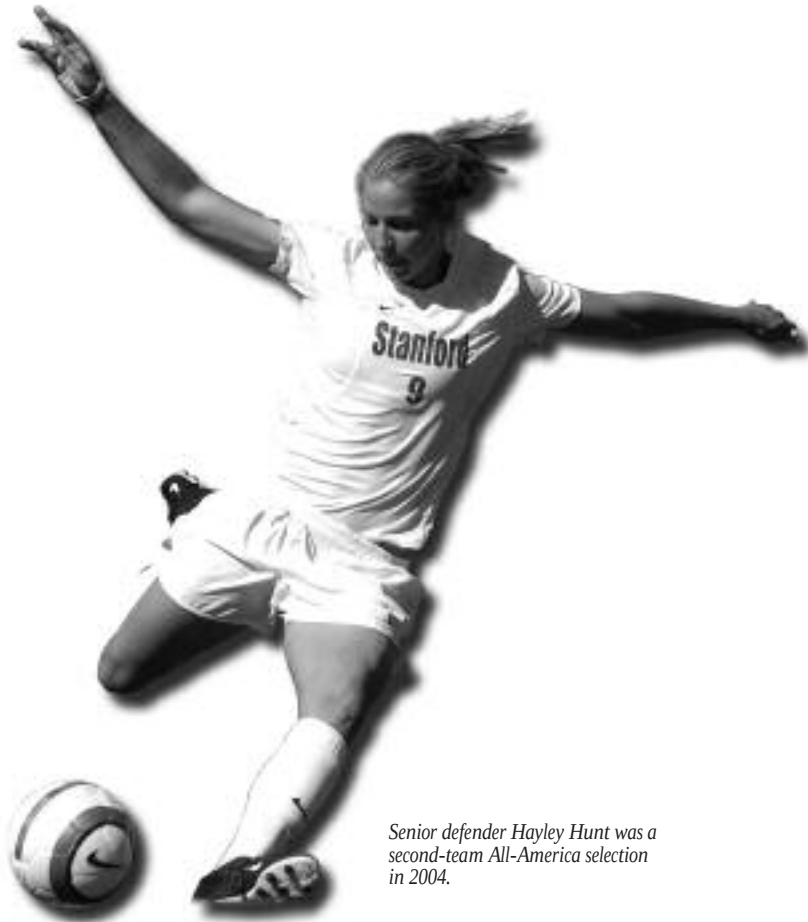
Forwards

Stanford lost three forwards to graduation, but redshirt senior Martha West and junior Gina Farias-Eisner will lead the Cardinal offense this fall. Last year, West scored three goals last season, including one game-winner, while Farias-Eisner added one goal.

Newcomer Hillary Heath, Washington's Gatorade Player of the Year, will challenge for a spot at forward, while fellow freshmen Lea MacKinnon, a two-time all-state selection, Kate Mannino, a member of the Washington ODP team since 2000, and Lauren Shapiro, the All-Arizona Player of the Year, will all seek playing time on the offensive side of the field.

"We have a solid group of forwards who will see playing time this year," notes Ratcliffe. "Our experienced players will provide a great balance for us, while our freshmen will bring a lot to the group, as well."

Stanford Athletics is referred to by many as the Home of Champions after being awarded 10 consecutive Sears Directors' Cup titles, presented annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) to the best overall collegiate athletic program in the country. The Cardinal women's soccer program has played a big part in that success.

The Cardinal have racked up a 251-1114-26 all-time record and a .684 winning percentage since the program's inception in 1984. Stanford has also appeared in the NCAA Tournament 13 of the past 14 seasons and has had 14 players selected to All-American teams over that time. This list of notable names includes U.S. Olympic gold medalist and National Player of the Year Julie Foudy and current Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) athletes Ronnie Fair, Marcia Wallis and Callie Withers.

The Cardinal's rapid rise to the top began in 1988 and hasn't slowed as the squad has made NCAA Tournament appearances a regular occurrence. The most dramatic of those came in 1993 when Stanford fell just short of qualifying for the NCAA Championship match.

The Cardinal defeated California 2-0 in first-round action and Portland 1-0 in the second round before

meeting George Mason in the Final Four Semifinals in Chapel Hill, N.C. The teams played to a 1-1 tie before George Mason pulled out a 3-1 victory in penalty kicks.

Stanford finished 18-2-2 in 1993, and was led by standout forward Sarah Rafanelli, who set school records for goals (20) and points (48) in a single season. Right behind Rafanelli was freshman Erin Martin, who set a school freshman record with 40 points. Goalkeeper Leslie Garrard allowed only eight goals all season long.

A year later, the Cardinal fell just short of the Final Four when it dropped a 2-1 match to Portland in triple overtime in the NCAA West Regional final. One day earlier, the Cardinal played to a scoreless tie with Washington before prevailing 6-5 in penalty kicks. In 1995, Stanford fell to Santa Clara 3-2 in first-round Tournament action, but not before taking the Broncos into triple overtime. Santa Clara proved to be too large of a challenge again in 1996, taking the Cardinal out of the tourney again in the first round.

The Cardinal would not appear in the Tournament again until 1998 when the squad was defeated 6-1 by BYU in the first round. Stanford made impressive showings in the NCAA Tournament in 1999, 2000 and 2001. It would not be until 2002 when the Cardinal would suffer another heartbreaking loss and be denied a berth into the semifinals.

Stanford boasted an 18-1 regular season record going into the initial rounds of the 2002 NCAA Tournament. The Cardinal virtually shut out Cal Poly (4-0), California (1-0) and Notre Dame (1-0) before facing Portland in the Tournament's quarterfinals. The Pilots and Cardinal battled to a 0-0 tie in double overtime until Portland was able to clinch the 4-2 victory in penalty kicks.

Besides producing great teams, Stanford's Maloney Field has also been home to some of the greatest collegiate women's soccer players in history. Julie Foudy, a member of the 1996 U.S. Olympic Team and a member of the U.S. National Team since 1991, was the first four-time All-American (1989-92) in the history of women's soccer on The Farm. She ranks second in school history in points scored and goals.

Forward Sarah Rafanelli became Stanford's other four-time All-American when she was honored from 1990-93. Rafanelli is the all-time leading point scorer in

school history with 152 and tops the Stanford charts in goals with 59.

Jessica Fischer earned national honors from 1993-95. She spearheaded a Cardinal defense that allowed just 52 goals over the course of her four years. All-American Erin Martin, 1993 Freshman All-American and 1996 Pac-10 Player of the Year, ranks first in shots on goal with 346 for the Cardinal, is the third-leading scorer in Stanford history (126 points) and ties for third in goals (49).

Maloney Field Home of Championship Soccer

Home to the Stanford men's and women's soccer programs, the newly renovated Maloney Field is one of the best collegiate soccer facilities in the country.

Completed in 1997, the field has played host to numerous collegiate, professional and international events, including the Women's World Cup in the summer of 1999, when Maloney Field was used as a practice field. Since the 1997 season, the Cardinal men have posted a 56-14-8 record in the facility, while the women have compiled a 59-18-5 mark.

Phase I of the renovation was completed in 1997, and included the upgrade of the field itself and the installation of temporary seating. The 115'x76' game field is adjacent to practice fields measuring 160'x120'.

The second phase of the upgrade was completed during the 1998 season. Phase II saw the installation of 80-foot high light poles around the perimeter of the field, making it possible to host night competition in accordance to NCAA standards. The lights are part of Musco Light's top-of-the-line TLC (Total Light Control) system. Permanent bleachers were also installed on the west side of the field, increasing the capacity at Maloney Field to approximately 2,000. The bleachers are precast concrete in two sections, with an entry plaza between them. A new Daktronics scoreboard and message center were also added to complete the field. Enhanced landscaping and the completion of Maloney Plaza link the facility to the rest of the Stanford Sports Complex.

With the renovation of Maloney Field, Stanford was selected as a site host-site for the first, second, third and quarterfinal



NCAA Tournament rounds in 2002; first, second and third-round matches in 2001; first and second-round matches in 2000; and second and third-round matches in 1999. Temporary bleachers were added for postseason play, and the games drew sellout crowds to watch the best collegiate soccer in one of the finest facilities in the country. Maloney Field has been the venue for a number of international and professional soccer events, hosting the Mexican Women's Team and the San Jose Earthquakes (Major League Soccer).

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew

students from all over the country: many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months – housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East – the first year foretold greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."



Stanford University The University at a Glance



Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

More than one hundred years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanfords' generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is an hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few miles north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, sports facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The university is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories – including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth – where faculty from a wide range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Paris, Kyoto, Santiago, Berlin, Oxford, Florence, and Moscow.

Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty – which numbers approximately 1,700 – is one of the most distinguished in the nation. It includes 16 Nobel laureates, 4 Pulitzer Prize winners, 21 National Medal of Science winners, 132 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 223 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, 80 members of the National Academy of Engineering, and 23 members of the National Academy of Education. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.

Currently 13,900 students, of which 6,500 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. About 40 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 100 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, 44 percent are African American, Asian American, Hispanic or Native American. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished. Approximately 10 students apply to Stanford for every place in the freshman class. Eighty-four Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars, 66 have been named Marshall Scholars, and 48 have been named Truman Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of graduating seniors plan to attend graduate or professional schools. Stanford students also shine in a tremendous array of activities outside the classroom – from student government to music, theater, and journalism. Through the Haas Center for Public Service, students participate in dozens of community service activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

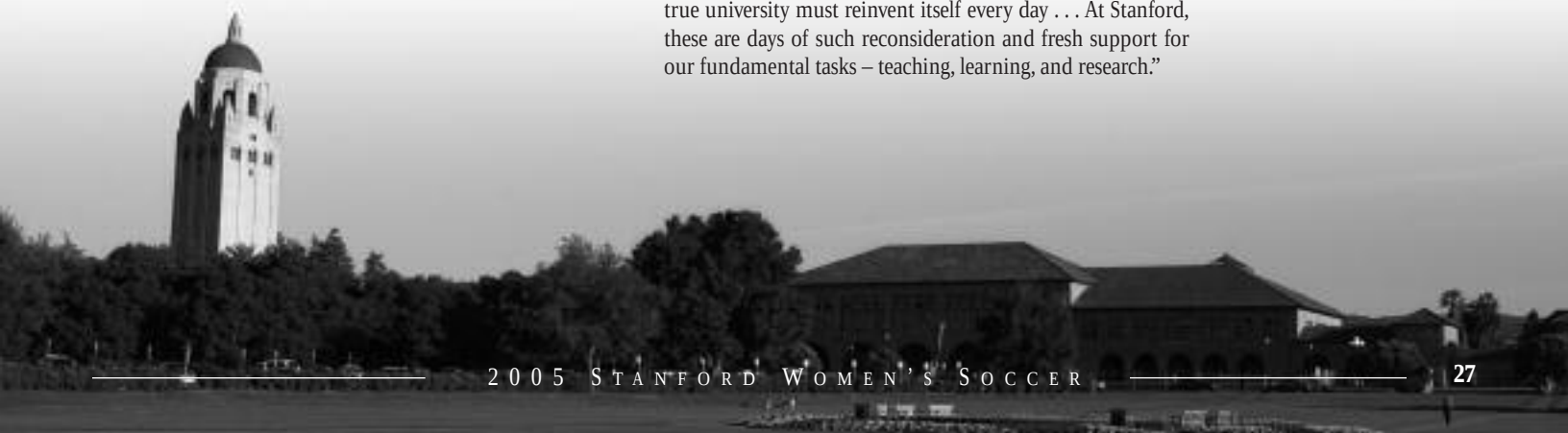
In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 34 Division I varsity sports – equally divided between men's and women's teams. Of Stanford's 101 national team titles, 50 have been captured since 1990, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's athletes and coaches participated in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, 49 competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Games, 34 represented Stanford at the 2000 Games in Sydney – by far the most of any university in the nation – and 42 Stanford athletes competed at the 2004 Games in Athens. Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 9,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, "... Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care." Her thoughts echo in the words of former Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, "The true university must reinvent itself every day ... At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks – teaching, learning, and research."

Stanford Athletics Home of Champions

“**H**ome of Champions.” Those are the bywords for the Stanford University Athletic Department.

And for good reason. No athletic department in the country can boast of the kind of success that Stanford has accomplished since the 1980's. NCAA team champions. NCAA individual champions. Olympic medalists. Stanford University athletes have been all over the world capturing championships.

The statistics speak for themselves: Stanford University has won 73 NCAA team championships since 1980, the most in the nation; Cardinal athletes have won 50 NCAA championships since 1990 – again the most in the nation. Stanford has brought home 29 NCAA championship trophies the past seven years, including an unprecedented six NCAA team titles in 1996-97. In 1991-92, Stanford athletes took home 29 individual NCAA titles – an NCAA record. Cardinal athletes won 21 individual championships during the 1992-93 season, the second most in history.

Even more impressive is Stanford's string of 11 consecutive NACDA Directors' Cup titles (1995-05). The award honors the nation's top overall athletic program and with 11 straight victories in the competition, it is no wonder Stanford is considered the dominant athletic program in the nation.

Stanford captured its 11th straight Directors' Cup in 2004-05. The Cardinal won a total of three national team crowns (two NCAA) in synchronized swimming (U.S. Collegiate), women's tennis and women's volleyball. Stanford had a total of 16 Top 10 finishes with lightweight crew, women's cross country, men's swimming, women's swimming, men's water polo and women's water polo joining the national champions in the Top Five. The Cardinal also picked up nine individual national titles (seven NCAA) and 13 team conference championships.

Stanford has now won at least one NCAA team championship for 28 straight years. Cardinal teams have also won four or more NCAA team titles in a single year nine times, an NCAA best.

All totaled, Stanford has won 101 collegiate team titles (90 NCAA championships) and 391 NCAA individual titles. Cardinal women

have won an NCAA-best 33 team championships while men's teams have captured 57 NCAA team titles, third-best in the nation. Overall, Stanford's 90 NCAA team championships rank second in the nation.

In the last 12 years (since 1993-94), Stanford has claimed 41 national team championships and 37 NCAA team titles – the best in the country.

The best athletic year in school history arguably came in 1996-97 when Cardinal teams set an NCAA record by winning six NCAA team championships in a single academic year: men's and women's cross country; men's and women's volleyball; and men's and women's

tennis. Nine other teams finished in the Top Four nationally, including second-place finishes in women's swimming, men's swimming, men's water polo and women's synchronized swimming. Stanford also posted third-place finishes in women's basketball, baseball and fencing, as well as fourth place finishes in women's golf and women's water polo. In addition, the Stanford co-ed sailing team added a ICYRA national championship.

The 1996-97 school year also saw the Cardinal football team advance to the Sun Bowl, the women's basketball team return to the Final Four, the baseball team qualify for the College World Series and the men's basketball team advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since it won the 1942 NCAA title.

Not only has the Cardinal won an NCAA record six NCAA team championships in a single season (1996-97), but it has also won five NCAA titles in a single year on three occasions: 1991-92, '94-95 and '97-98. Cardinal teams have won four championships in a single academic year on five occasions: 1985-86, '86-87, '92-93, '93-94 and 2001-02.

Stanford has won 173 conference or regional titles since 1991, again the best in the country. Cardinal teams won a record 18 conference or regional championships in 1998-99 – by far the best performance of any school in the nation.

Another memorable moment came in 1999-2000 when the Cardinal football, men's basketball and baseball teams won at least a share of their respective Pac-10 titles for the first time in school history.

Stanford has simply dominated in several sports. The Cardinal men's tennis team has won 17 NCAA titles while the women's squad has hauled in 15 national titles. Other programs to have brought in at least five national titles include men's water polo (11), women's swimming (9), men's swimming (8), men's golf (7) and women's volleyball (6).

Stanford has also enjoyed unequaled success in Olympic competition. Stanford was represented by 43 affiliates at the most recent Olympic Games that took place in 2004 in Athens, Greece. The Cardinal totaled 17 medals (three gold, seven silver, seven bronze).

At the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia, Stanford was represented by a total of 34 athletes and coaches. The Cardinal contingent won a total of 10 medals – four gold, three silver and three bronze.

At the 1996 Games in Atlanta, Stanford placed 49 coaches and athletes on Olympic teams, including three head United States Olympic coaches (Tara VanDerveer, women's basketball; Richard Quick, women's

swimming; Skip Kenney, men's swimming). Stanford athletes accounted for 16 gold medals, one silver and one bronze in Atlanta.

At the 1992 Games in Barcelona, Cardinal athletes earned 19 medals – 10 gold, four silver and five bronze. If Stanford were a country, it would've placed 13th in the world with its 19 medals and ninth with 10 golds. Thirty-eight Stanford-affiliated athletes and coaches participated in Barcelona while 41 members of the Cardinal family took part in the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

Olympic gold medalists are numerous on The Farm. Former Cardinal standout Bob Mathias won back-to-back Olympic decathlon gold medals in 1948 and '52, while swimmers Pablo Morales, Jenny Thompson, Summer Sanders, Janet Evans and Misty Hyman have become household names in the swimming world.

Morales, who helped Stanford win three straight NCAA team championships (1985-87), won three medals at the 1984 Games in Los Angeles (one gold, two silver) and two more gold medals at the 1992 Games in Barcelona. Evans won three golds in the 1988 Games in Seoul, and one gold and one silver in Barcelona, while Sanders won four medals in Barcelona; two gold, one silver and one bronze. Thompson is the most decorated athlete in Olympic history with 12 medals (eight gold, three silver, one bronze). Hyman added her name to the list of Stanford swimming greats by winning the 2000 Olympic gold medal in the 200 meter butterfly to pull off one of the biggest upsets of the Sydney Olympiad.

A list of the great student-athletes in the history of Stanford Athletics would be difficult to even come close to compiling but a few of the great names in the amazing history of Stanford Athletics include Tom Watson and Tiger Woods (golf); Tim Mayotte, John McEnroe and Roscoe Tanner (men's tennis); Kristin Klein, Ogona Nnamani, Kim Oden and Logan Tom (women's volleyball); Kristin Folk (women's basketball/volleyball); Jack McDowell and Mike Mussina (baseball); Julie Foudy (women's soccer); Hank Luisetti, Brevin Knight and Mark Madsen (men's basketball); Jennifer Azzi and Kate Starbird (women's basketball); Jim Plunkett, John Elway and Troy Walters (football); Debi Thomas (figure skating); Eric Heiden (speed skating) and the great Ernie Nevers (football); just to name a few.

It's no wonder Stanford University is often referred to as the "NCAA's Champion of Champions."

Stanford University captured its 11th consecutive NCAA Division I Sports Academy Directors' Cup in 2004-05. The award is presented annually by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) to the best overall collegiate athletic program in the country.

The Cardinal won three national team championships in 2004-05 (synchronized swimming, women's tennis, women's volleyball), while a total of 11 teams finished among the Top five nationally and 18 teams placed in the Top 10.

Stanford teams finishing in the Top 10 were synchronized swimming (1st), women's tennis (1st), women's volleyball (1st), men's swimming and diving (2nd), men's water polo (2nd), women's water polo (2nd), lightweight crew (5th), women's cross country (5th), women's swimming and diving (5th), women's outdoor track (5th), women's basketball (5th-T), men's cross country (6th), men's crew (7th), men's gymnastics (7th), women's sailing (7th), men's outdoor track (7th), women's indoor track (8th) and softball (9th-T).

Developed as a joint effort between *USA Today* and NACDA, the Sports Academy Directors' Cup is the only all-sports competition that recognizes the institution in each of the four categories with the best overall athletics program.
